Chairman's message

I hope you all enjoyed an excellent Christmas and New Year, but are now getting back in shape to finish off the league season.

It's that time of year when I would like to take the opportunity to thank all of the people who work hard week in week out to make table tennis available to us all: Mike Prior, who does all the setting up ready for our league matches, Ted who processes the results, Mike who again plans, sets up and runs all of our competitions. Then there are the team who open up the centre on a regular basis, are there to welcome new members and ensure things run smoothly. Finally, Martin, who keeps the centre in tip top condition to enable all of this to take place. There are many others who contribute, so please forgive me if you haven't had a specific mention.

We have a team from Isle of Wight Table Tennis entered into the Island Games in June this year. Lead by Danny Burns, the team have been practising hard and raising funds in support of their trip to Gibraltar.

We want Table Tennis on the Isle of Wight to appeal equally to all levels, but have had some difficulty providing the level of competition needed to motivate the better Division 1 players. Ted has suggested creating a premier division for just the top 5 or 6 teams, who could play one another up to 4 times over the winter season. Your committee would be very interested to hear views or counter proposals from anyone on this. We just want to find a way of including everyone.

Finally, we hope to run a 'development' weekend at some point in 2019. There hasn't been an event of this type run on the island for many years, except for juniors. This would be for anyone, at any level, who wants to improve. At the moment we are just trying to understand what the interest might be.

In order to do this a coach would be brought over from the mainland, but supported by up to 6 of the island's better players. Costs aren't yet finalised as it depends upon numbers, but we think it could be roughly £30 per player per day. Places would be on a first come basis.

League News

Division One

Ryde A lead the table with a 6 point lead over Shanklin Piranhas, but Shanklin have a game in hand. The title race is between these two teams as there is a gap of nearly 30 points to the third placed team, Rookley Rhinos. However, Vics A are in contention for this spot and a number of teams are within a few points of each other so it should prove an exciting second half of the season.

Danny Burns continues with a 100% average but has played fewer matches than the other top performers. Don and Ollie are on over 90%, with Lee, Dave Hilliam and Temeesha all on over 80%. Young Hugh continues to impress and has won two thirds of his matches. Anna Joyce has joined Barry and Sean playing for Vics B in the league in preparation for the Island Games in Gibraltar and has been improving rapidly since coming back into the sport.



Division Two

Havenstreet Hooters lead the table by 15 points from Shanklin B with Ryde Peers only 2 points behind in third place and the battle for second place looks to be between these two teams.

Alan Hulbert is on 100% average, although having played fewer matches than the others at the top, with Ian, Trevor and Dave all on over 90%, with Kevin on 86%. All players in Shanklin B have over a 60% win average as do all the players in Havenstreet.

Division Three

Division Three continues to be the most hotly contested division this year, with Ryde Rockers having stretched their lead at the top to 11 points, but with a number of teams vying for second place. At the moment Vics D are holding on but being challenged closely by the youngsters of the Rookies and the not so young Rustics, with other teams also in contention.

A number of new players continue to do well, especially Spike, young Joseph Chapman in his first season, and Trevor. Martin Dove leads the averages with 100%, while Spike has over 90% and Neil and Joseph have over 80%. Young Ollie and Ross of the Rookies have also performed impressively having won at least half of their matches in their first season.

Around The Clubs

Havenstreet Table Tennis Club by Joy Wickens

Havenstreet Table Tennis Club was formed in 1951 by Tony James, when he came out of the Air Force, having met up with Fred Perry, while there.

The venue was the Church Room, which was opposite St Peter's Church. This was available unless other events, such as Whist Drives or Beetle Drives were planned. This meant that in the school holidays play could go on all day, so lots of practice time available for school children, and players improved rapidly. The rent was £5 a year!

After a year or so a team was entered in the league, with Tony taking the team to matches on his motor bike and side car. There were many more venues around the Island in those days. After many matches of losing 10-0, Rob Frampton won the first game for the club. He continued to play until about 2000.

The club began with Havenstreet residents, but gradually some players came from further afield. The club soon had several teams including a good first division team. First division players were Mick Sparshott, Doug Cant, Dave Knight, Bill Woodmore.

Village names associated with the club over many years were Frampton, Ridell, Attrill, Leal, Hayles, Winter, George, Johnson, Butt, Newberry and Batten. Dave Rendle was not a resident but has played for the club since he was young and is still playing. Mike Platt and Allan Peaker played for many years.

The village school closed in 1970, becoming the Community Centre. The Table Tennis Club has played there since 1972 with very good conditions for a single table.

There were three or four teams for many years and one season there were actually 7. Of course, there were 5 or 6 divisions for many years! Lots of us would enter the various tournaments at BHC, and at Columbia, every year. One year in the 70s we collected about 7 trophies between us at the annual Table Tennis Dinner.

Since 1956 a handicap tournament has been played each year for a Shield. The first winner was Barry Turnbull. It is a record of the names of players throughout the years.

Sadly, this season there is only one Havenstreet side. Hopefully, there will be more next year. It would be sad to see the club disappear after nearly 70 years.

Havenstreet play home matches on Tuesday evenings and are looking for more players to join them for next season so they can enter at least one more team. Practice nights can be held on free Tuesdays if there is enough interest and the cost of the hall hire (£12) would be covered by those

A few recollections of past venues (and an unbroken record)

Today we enjoy (mostly) excellent playing conditions at several venues including the purpose-built table tennis centre at Smallbrook but it wasn't always thus.

Although we occasionally moan about things such as parking, noise, etc., compared with yesteryear when there were so many more clubs, we are in the lap of luxury. Let me give a few examples.

Most church hall playing conditions were excellent with wooden floors, just a single table and plenty of room. Before moving to the community building, Wroxall played in one such hall with just these attributes. Unfortunately it had a fourth - a corrugated iron roof. This was fine - unless it rained hard when the deafening cacophony put paid to any thoughts of continuing the match until the rain eased off. This gave an unfair advantage to disco aficionados who, of course, had no problems.

One Cowes club inhabited a beer cellar which was only accessible via a very steep wooden stair - more of a ladder. It had enough room for one table (just) with only a couple of feet between the sides and the walls and (it seemed) not much more at either end. A single fluorescent light over the table gave sufficient illumination but caused a fast ball to seemingly move in a fit-inducing series of jerks - but Health & Safety hadn't been invented then.

Another Cowes venue in a working men's club (?) was ideal except that you couldn't ever guarantee to complete a rally without interruption as it was also the route from the bar to the loo and traffic increased significantly during the evening.

I don't know what it was about Cowes TT venues but a third consisted of a portakabin which also served as a storage container for old tables, chairs and other unwanted bric-a-brac in which TT balls took up residence. You only needed to play one match here to qualify as a furniture remover.

A Rookley venue had a unique feature - a large hole in the ceiling which TT balls found strangely attractive as they disappeared into this orifice with alarming frequency. They (players, not balls) eventually moved to an adjacent room exchanging the ball-swallowing ceiling for a floor furnished

with ill-fitting carpet tiles. This did promote some interesting gymnastic moves as the tiles slid from under your feet.

Moving to the Island in 1968 to work for BHC I joined Ryde TT club whose home was in the Melville Hall, Melville Street. At that time it wasn't quite as derelict as it is today. The hall could accommodate three tables and, if you played on the table nearest the entrance on a rainy day, you could enjoy a shower while you played as there was a permanent leak in the roof directly above it.

Another benefit was the ability to practise in complete darkness if the electricity meter hadn't been fed enough shillings - a frequent occurrence as we were an impecunious lot.

Moving now to the record: Some time during the '70s, before setting up the Columbia TT venue, John Prean and his son Carl came along to play at Ryde and I was on one occasion asked to give Carl a little practise. Never one to avoid a challenge I acceded to this request and, playing a 3-end game to put a time limit on it, I proceeded to win the contest. As I could never expect to repeat this success, I studiously avoided ever playing him again, thus maintaining my 100% record against the 3-times English Table Tennis Men's Champion. I lived on this reputation for years!

(Oh, did I mention that Carl was 5 or 6 years old at the time?)

Thank you Bert for this wonderful article, bringing back many memories to lots of you I'm sure. I can remember the Cowes club with the ladder cum staircase and the excitement of negotiating it to reach the table tennis table.


