I had known Dave for about 40 years plus although during the last decade or so our paths didn't cross all that often. He was always jolly and good fun to be with. He used to work at the mast station on top of Ventnor Downs. Ventnor club room was in Lowtherville road, it was a little run down and used to leak a bit when it rained, nevertheless it was a happy club room. I used to go there every Sunday to do a spot of coaching with what limited ability I had and play a few singles and doubles. They had two tables and around six regulars and we all had a bit of fun. Dave was the News Sheet editor for about 25 years, it was always a good read, full of wit and stories.

He was an active member of the Ventnor Jazz band which attended most if not all of the carnivals. He would dress up as a member of the foreign legion wearing their notable headwear and a painted on red nose. They did a lot of fund raising and visited many bars on the way. I'm sure they took in a few beverages on their travels. They were always good fun. Dave sat on the Islands table tennis committee for many years. I only saw him occasionally of late when he entered tournaments at Smallbrook but he always enjoyed himself. The Island has lost a good character and I'm very sad to hear of his passing. May he rest in peace.



The Telegraph, who always gave good coverage to table tennis, reported on Carl Prean...

Widespread controversy continues to surround the teenager's development and in particular the coaching of him at the court side. ETTA officials maintain that his best results have been achieved on occasions when he has been advised at the table by the England coaches and when his father has not been present..."

The March edition had more Prean and Isle of Wight news:

Peter Charters, the Vice Chairman of the ETTA was a little upset with John Prean:

As far as my'identity problem' is concerned I suggest to John that he stand for the post of national councillor for the Isle of Wight. This' would provide him with the forum he seems to want and it would help him realise that those who manage the affairs of the ETTA are accountable to others, have to accept the majority view even when it conflicts with their own, and stick to the job when they don't always get their own way. They also annually put themselves up to be shot down. That is democracy and that is not only MY identity within the ETTA, but also the position of members of the National Council and Management Committee.


More sensations

If you are a strong favourite, the crowd will warm to the 'underdog' and Regina was grateful when the second game was over. Joe Daly won the 'Consolation'. What a fluent player he is! I thought this again when I saw him in the final of the Veterans when he was eventually beaten by his brother Jim, but not till the third game of a splendid top spin encounter that made me feel young again for a while. Ian Urry had earlier won the Cadets and Juniors in one day and his sister Sharon also looked good. Let us hope that we shall have something to offer them if and when they outgrow our own 1st division. Rob Warren won the Intermediate (From Div. 2 down). He was what he has been throughout the season - the best player in the section, though **Roger Merry** nearly won the final.

Here is a selection of comments:

Who are these Preans, who burst upon the scene and take it upon themselves to conduct a witch-hunt against men of integrity who have been democratically elected to run the E.T.T.A.? How many people had even heard of them before Carl started playing? Not many I'll be bound.

I wish to register a strong protest against the banning of John Prean from the pages of Table Tennis News. In my opinion, his were the only contributions that made an otherwise boring journal readable.

Concerning the banning of John Prean: Voltaire said it much better than I can. "I disagree with everything you say. but will defend to the death your right to say it."

Vour decision to exercise editorial judgement to put an end to the welter of correspondence from Mr. John Prean has brought welcome relief to myself and. I suspect many more of our fraternity who have grown weary of the constant repetition on the same themes spread over thousands of word[~]. the reading of which eventually induced boredom to the point of nausea.

I wish to make it clear my over-riding message is one of total and utter support for John's ability to air his views whether I or any other person agree or disagree. it would be totally wrong and totally offensive for the Magazine to put a ban on John particularly if he offers criticism of the Establishment.

At one National Council meeting I heard Mrs. Prean describe the E.T.T.A. as a "Fascist Regime". Really. how low can you sink. I will never forgive her. We in this country are preparing to celebrate the 40th anniversary of the end of the second world war. in which my father fought to help rid Europe of the fascism which -was destroying it. and I cannot. for the life of me. understand the mentality of a person who compares the E.T.T.A. with those who perpetrated such outrageous evil upon mankind.

I am afraid that the obituary notice for John Prean's views which appeared in the March issue will do less than nothing to reassure those of us who believe the sport faces very serious problems. There are too many causes for concern and too few evidences of effective action to meet this concern.
