










# Introduction

## Week 7 Report 27 June 2016

Week 7 and into the second half of the series, this week again saw a low turnout of 13 (probably due to the fact that England were playing in the European football championships – but probably best to ice over that!.)

Yonatan Slobodskoy had a good week, taking out both Richard Fifield and Eric Van Looy before coming up against Hari Gehlot in the semi-final. Yonatan went down 11-4 in the first leg but came back fighting hard to take the second one 15-13 over Hari. Another close leg in the third, losing 9-11 and then Hari was into his stride taking the 4<sup>th</sup> end 11-5 to secure a place in the final.

Daniel Moses had a clean run through to the final, taking all of his matches in 3 sets against Gwynne Penny, then Trevor Organ and Joshua Gallen. The final saw Daniel Moses vs Hari Gehlot for the third time during this Grand Prix series and for the third time Daniel took the match in 3 sets.

In the consolation event new club member Dmitry Khakhamov beat Trevor Organ in 3 sets (11-3, 11-3, 11-7) and then went on to play Ian Cole in the semi-final. After a very close first leg (15-13), Dmitry took the next two legs 11-6 and 11-4. This secured his place in the consolation final. Meanwhile, Eric Van Looy had a very tight battle against Joe Barraclough, with Joe taking the first end 11-9. Eric came back to take the second 11-7. A very close fought third end saw Eric come

back from 8-10 down to take it 12-10. Joe fought back in the 4<sup>th</sup> leg 11-6 but couldn't quite keep the consistency going and bowed out 11-7 in the 5<sup>th</sup>. Eric's semi final opponent (Calin Spicica) scratched out which put Eric up against Dmitry Khakhamov in the consolation final. In a close fought battle, Eric took the first end but Dmitry came back to take the next 3 for the win.

Overall, Daniel Moses continues to lead the series with 797 points. Martin Adams is on 519, Hari Gehlot 391, Trung Tran 335 and Mark Banks 269. Joe Barraclough continues to lead the juniors but Joshua Gallen has closed the gap to second place to just 42 points, with Yonatan just behind on 177.

Week 8 Report 4 July 2016

Week 8 brought 20 entries with one notable absentee: Daniel Moses.

In the last 16, Grand Prix Host, Rick Leachman notched up his first ever victory over Trevor Organ. Rick showed steady determination throughout, after taking the first leg 11-7, Trevor came back to take the second 7-11. Rick then took the next 11-6 but Trevor answered with 11-9. The final leg was a tight battle, but Rick finished ahead, 11-8. Another round 16 match that looked likely to go the distance took place between Krassi Ivanov and Joshua Gallen. Joshua took the first leg 11-9. Krassi came back with 11-7 and 11-9 and Johsua battled well, pulling off some fantastic shots, but in the end couldn't quite push it to 5 as Krassi took the 4<sup>th</sup> 11-9.

Elsewhere in the last 16, Yonatan Slobodskoy and training partner Joe Barraclough played one another with a close game 11-9 to Yonatan. He then took the 2<sup>nd</sup> leg 11-5. Joe was not to be put down easily and rallied to take the 3<sup>rd</sup> leg 11-5 but couldn't quite keep the momentum going in the 4<sup>th</sup> leg and went out 11-6.

Martin Adams was back this week and efficiently dispatched both Tony Reynolds and Yonatan on his route to the semi-final where he met Simon Vine. Simon put up a good fight, and after going down 6-11 and 8-11 in the first two, managed to take the third end 11-8 but Martin came back strong in the 4<sup>th</sup> 11-1.

Meanwhile, Hari Gehlot beat Harry Munro and Krassi Ivanov to secure his semi-final place. He then faced Trung Tran who started well and took the first two 12-10, 11-8. Hari then came back in the next two 11-4, 11-7 and kept it going in the 5<sup>th</sup> to emerge with 11-7 for the win.

In the final, Martin started strongly 11-3. Hari replied with 11-5. Martin took the third end 11-9 and sealed it with 11-8 in the 4<sup>th</sup>.

The consolation event felt a bit like a main event with Tony Reynolds, Martin Gunn, Steve Miller and Harry Munro all in it. In a semi-final that was fought like a final, Tony had a good match with Martin, using spin and placement to his advantage to take the first end 11-5 and the second 12-10. Martin managed to tighten things up in the 3<sup>rd</sup> end and took it 11-9 but Tony was determined and they battled it out in a very close 4<sup>th</sup> end, with Tony just managing to secure the win 13-11.

Harry Munro beat Calin Spicica in 4 sets which put him into the semi final with Steve Miller. Harry dominated the match, winning 11-7, 11-0, 11-8 – an outstanding performance, especially considering that it had been some 3 weeks since he played last. He then went into the final against Tony Reynolds and put in another good performance in the first leg 11-8. A lapse of concentration appeared to cost him in the second, which Tony took advantage of to the tune of 11-2 but Harry started to get some ground back in the 3<sup>rd</sup> leg 11-8. He then really seemed to focused on his topspin play and managed to take the 4<sup>th</sup> leg 11-9. With momentum now on his side, he marched home 11-3 to take the 5<sup>th</sup>.

Overall, Daniel Moses continues to lead the series with 797 points. Martin Adams closes the gap a little on 654, Hari Gehlot 489, Trung Tran 399 and Mark Banks 293. Joe Barraclough continues to lead the juniors on 280 with Joshua Gallen on 240 and Yonatan Slobodskoy on 214.

Week 9 Report 11 July 2016

Week 9 brought 22 entrants to the Grand Prix. Daniel Moses was back this week, Elson Costa made his second appearance in the series and Liam McTiernan made his first appearance of the series. No Martin Gunn or Mark Banks this week.

In the last 16, Liam beat Simon Vine in 3 sets and then went on to play Tony Reynolds who put up a spirited fight, taking the first leg 11-6. Liam took the next three 11-9, 11-8 and 11-9 – close matches and a good performance by both players. Liam then went on to play Trung Tran in the semi-final and had another 3 close games (11-9, 11-9, 11-8) to secure his place in the final. Meanwhile, Martin Adams took 3 games to defeat Rob Gladstone in the last 16 and then faced Daniel Moses in the quarter final. Martin took the first two legs 11-7 but Daniel fought back in the third to take it 15-13.

An epic 4<sup>th</sup> leg ensued with both players making full use of the available court. In the end Martin prevailed in the 4<sup>th</sup> game 18-16, to reach the semi-final where he beat Krassi Ivanov (11-4, 11-7 and 13-11).

The final between Liam McTiernan and Martin Adams was decided in 3 sets with Liam taking the first 11-8. In the second set Martin managed to get it to 10-10 but Liam picked up the 2 deciding points to take it 12-10. He then got well into his stride and took the third end 11-2.

In the consolation rounds, Yonatan Slobodskoy put in some good performances to beat Joe Barraclough and Steve Miller in 4 sets each. On the other side of the draw, Eric

Van Loy beat Nigel Keedy and Rob Gladstone in 3 sets each, and then had a tough semi-final match with Elson Costa – losing the first leg 10-12 then taking the next two 11-7, 11-8 but faltering on the 4<sup>th</sup> end 3-11. Eric's determination in the deciding set paid off with 11-9 to book his place in the consolation final.

And what a final it turned out to be! Played just before 11pm, with only the players and hosts in attendance, it was a cracking match between Yonatan and Eric. Eric took the first leg 11-6 but Yonatan recovered well to take the second 11-9 and the third 11-8 – making good use of his ability to recover quickly between forehand and backhand counter-topspin shots to stay in the rallies. In the third leg Eric took control and managed to hold him down to just 5, setting things up for a great fifth set. At the switchover point it was 5-2 to Eric, but Yonatan managed to pull it back to 5-5. It was then neck and neck to the end with Yonatan managing to take the 5<sup>th</sup> set 11-9.

Overall, Daniel Moses continues to lead the series with 849 points. Martin Adams is on 744, Hari Gehlot 539, Trung Tran 459 and Tony Reynold 337.5. Joe Barraclough continues to lead the juniors on 308 with Joshua Gallen on 276 and Yonatan Slobodskoy on 274.







Week 10 Report 18 July 2016

Week 10 brought a heatwave with the thermometer exceeding 30 degrees centigrade, so no real surprise that we only had 16 entrants for the Grand Prix.

In the last 16, there was a close battle between Trung Tran and Dmitry Khakhamov. Dmitry took the first leg 11-9. Trung took the second 11-6 and then the third 11-4, but Dmitry was not to be beaten that easily and he responded in the 4<sup>th</sup> with 11-8. In a close 5<sup>th</sup> set it was Trung who won through in the end 11-7.

In the quarter finals, Tony Reynolds had a close game with Yonatan Slobodskoy. Tony took the first leg 11-7 and Yonatan answered by taking the second 11-7. The third leg went in Tony's favour, 11-

8. Yonatan wasn't quite able to clinch the 4<sup>th</sup> which went for Tony 11-7. Tony then had a very tough draw against Daniel Moses in the Semi-Final. He put up a good fight, taking the second leg 18-16 but Daniel sealed it in the 4<sup>th</sup>, 11-8 to book his place in the final.

Meanwhile, Martin Adams had a clean run through to the final winning all his matches in 3 sets. Joe Barraclough had some great rallies with him but wasn't able to secure the points he needed for a win. Trung Tran managed to get to deuce with Martin the quarter finals first leg but then went out 6-11, 6-11. Elson Costa also managed to take one leg to deuce with Martin but lost it 12-10 in the third.

The final showdown, between Daniel Moses and Martin Adams, which is the 4<sup>th</sup> time that they have contested the main event final in this series, Daniel took the first leg 11-

9. Martin took the second 11-4. Daniel replied with 11-5 and then denied Martin a  $5^{th}$  set by closing out the  $4^{th}$  leg 11-8.

In the Consolation round, Grand Prix Host Rick Leachman and assistant Gwynne both made it to the Semi-finals. Rick clocked up another good win over Trevor Organ – in 4 sets and Gwynne managed her first match win of the series over Joe Barraclough in 3 sets. Trevor then went on to face Dmitry Khakhamov in the semi-final and managed to take the third leg 11-6, but Dmitry's game proved too strong and he took the 4<sup>th</sup> 11-9. Gwynne faced Harry Munro and struggled to read his serve which cost her too many points throughout the 3 sets, although the middle set was close with Harry taking it 15-13.

This set up a good consolation final between Harry Munro and Dmitry Khakhamov. Dmitry took the first leg 11-8 and despite trailing by a few points in the second leg, Dmitry came back to take it 12-10 and kept a cool head to win through the third 11-9.

Overall, Daniel Moses continues to lead the series with 970 points. Martin Adams is on 842, Hari Gehlot 580, Trung Tran 499 and Tony Reynold 398.5. Joe Barraclough continues to lead the juniors on 334 with Yonatan Slobodskoy on 317 overtaking Joshua Gallen this week who is on 276.

Week 11 Report 25 July 2016

Week 11 and the penultimate in the series saw temperatures return to normal for the time of year, and number of entries at a respectable 21.

There were 3 outstanding matches in the last 32 this week that deserve mention. Simon Vine and Rod Kay battled it out in an incredibly close 5-set game with Rod taking the first leg 11-9 and then having to dig deep to take the second 17-15. Simon then came back to take the third 12-10 and the 4<sup>th</sup> 11-8. He kept the pressure on in the 5<sup>th</sup> and won through 11-7. Andrew Smith and Trevor Organ also battled it out in 5. Andrew took the first leg 11-6 but Trevor took the next two 12-10 and 12-10. Andrew wrestled control back in the 4<sup>th</sup> 11-5 and secured his place in the next round with a good 11-

6 win in the 5<sup>th</sup>. The third outstanding match saw an exciting battle between Eric Van Looy and Daniel Moses. Eric took the first leg 11-5. Daniel replied with 11-6. Eric then took the next 11-9. The 4<sup>th</sup> set was fought over hard but in the end Daniel came through 11-9 to force it to five and then took the last set 11-6.

In the last 16 there were also some very close matches. Elson Costa and Simon Vine battled hard with 4 extremely tight games, Elson eventually winning through in the 5<sup>th</sup> set. Andrew Smith managed to pick up a good win over Joshua Gallen in 4 sets. Martin Adams kept Krassi contained to 3 sets. Rob Gladstone took one set off Hari Gehlot. Trung Tran used his counter attack from the back of the court well against Steve Miller and managed to win in 3 sets after a close first set (12-10). Guy De La Villesbrunne put up a valiant fight against Richard Fifield, 9-11, 7-11, 8-11 and bagging a bonus point in the process. Daniel Moses and Tony Reynolds both cruised through on 3 straight sets against Joe Barraclough and Gwynne Penny.

In the quarter finals there was a tough five-setter between Hari Gehlot and Elson Costa with Hari taking the first leg 13-11. Elson then came back to take the next two 11-4 and 11-9. Hari replied with 11-5, setting up a very close 5<sup>th</sup> set which went to 10-10 before Hari managed to clinch the last 2 points for the win. Martin Adams took out Andrew Smith in 3 straight sets.

Meanwhile, Trung Tran won a close 3-set game against Richard Fifield and Daniel Moses took 4 sets to see off Tony Reynolds.

The semi finals saw Trung Tran battle with Daniel Moses, almost managing to push it to 4 sets, going out 10-12 in the third and a very close 5-set battle between Martin Adams and Hari Gehlot with Hari taking legs 1 and 4 but not quite holding on in the last one which Martin took 11-8.

The final showdown saw another Adams vs Moses final, but this time it all went Martin's way, winning in 3 straight: 11-5, 11-5, 11-3.

In the Consolation round, Eric continued to show good form and won his way through to the final with a 5-setter over Calin Spicica and a 4-setter over Rod Kay. Joshua Gallen saw off Rick Leachman and Rob Gladstone in 3 straight to book his place in the consolation final. He then put on a great performance in the first two sets, winning 11-7 and 11-4. Eric fought back and took the third leg 11-8 but a determined Joshua took the next 11-7 to close out the match in 4-sets.

Overall, Daniel Moses continues to lead the series with 1066 points. Martin Adams is on 966, Hari Gehlot 639, Trung Tran 561 and Tony Reynold 438.5. Joe Barraclough continues to lead the juniors on 364 with Joshua Gallen retaking the 2<sup>nd</sup> slot on 353 and Yonatan Slobodskoy (absent this week) moves back into 3<sup>rd</sup> on 317.

The Quarter Finals were also settled in straight sets with Daniel Moses seeing off Richard Rosinski and Hari Gehlot making great use of placement around the table to take out Joshua Gallen 11-8, 11-8, 11-4. On the other side of the draw, Trung Tran took out Andrew Smith 11-5, 11-4, 11-6 with some great counter-hit rallies between the pair and Martin Adams closed out Rod Kay 12-10, 11-3, 11-7.

The first 4-setter of the evening came in the semi-final between Martin Adams and Trung Tran with Trung taking the first leg 11-7. Martin replied with 11-8, 11-9 and 11-6, seeing him safely through to the final. Meanwhile, Daniel Moses confidently took on Hari Gehlot with a 3-set win 11-2, 11-5, 11-7 to book his place in the final.

The final showdown between Martin Adams and Daniel Moses was a fitting series main event finale. At 12-12 in the first leg it was clear this was going to be a hard fought battle and impossible to predict which way it would go. Both players made full use of the available court space and there were some fantastic counter-spin rallies with Daniel retrieving the ball from seemingly impossible positions at times.





- 1. Members should treat the Clubhouse, playing area and equipment with respect and apply due care at all times when using it. Fire extinguishers must not be used as doorstops but remain in position ready for use.
- 2. When entering the club please remove outdoor shoes and change into sports shoes before entering the playing courts.
- 3. Use the appropriate changing rooms when getting ready to play.
- 4. Please respect the ladies changing room. Only males with serious disability should use this facility.
- 5. Store sports bags under the chairs in the playing area, the changing room and the Social Area not on them.
- 6. Remember that you are not the only one using the club and keep noise levels to a minimum as it distracts players on other tables, who are either practicing or playing league matches.
- 7. If tables are moved for practice purposes please ensure that you return the playing area to its normal playing format of two match tables and three practice tables after your session.
- 8. If all the practice tables are in use and others are waiting to play, please ensure that you vacate a table after a maximum of 40 minutes use.
- 9. Please use the bins to discard any rubbish such as water bottles, wrappers etc. Do not leave them on the floor, window sills or seats.
- 10. If you use crockery and/or cutlery in the kitchen please ensure that it is washed, dried and put away again after use. It is not the job of the club cleaners to tidy up after you.
- 11. Switch off the lights over the table you have been using when finished.
- 12. When leaving the club please ensure that all the emergency doors are closed, all lights are switched off and, if you are the last to leave, Chubb-lock the main entrance door.




This season has been interesting for Kingfisher C as we've been busy in the transfer window and recruited some fresh talent to our squad after losing Niall & Lisa.

## Ken Fellingham Cup


The Ken Fellingham Cup Ranking Tournament took place at Kingfisher on Sunday 23 October and was organized by David Holt.

I started playing this wonderful sport of ours back in 1955 and, no matter what problems rear their ugly heads from time to time, I cannot think of life without table tennis.

In those bygone, halcyon days I lived in Greater Manchester and I played every week at the Manchester YMCA, one of the foremost clubs in the country. To the best of my knowledge there were no superb custom-built premises like Kingfisher, Draycott, Ormesby or Cippenham but the Manchester "YM" had a wonderful sports hall that, for one day a week, belonged to table tennis. Jeff Ingber (England's Joint-Number 1 at the time and the top player



in Lancashire, pictured) practised there on a regular basis, as did Derek Schofield, a player well-known to many of Kingfisher's older playing fraternity. At the time, Derek was Cheshire's top senior player. Another chap who played there was our very own Wally Allanson who a decade or so ago made up one-third of the infamous and nefarious Halliday/Allanson/Samuel squad from Sonning Common. Wally and I had many common memories from that era and, as is the norm with older people, we've had lots of conversations along the lines of "Do you remember old so-and-so and what about Miss Thingummy?" I personally was a very lowly-ranked Cheshire Junior

at the time. Wally was much better than I was.

In 1959, the Navy and then the BBC took me abroad for over twenty years and, as a consequence, I missed the "Senior" bit of our sport completely. In 1982 I returned to the UK as an aged veteran when Brian Halliday (and, subsequently Allan Bruton) took me under his wing and found a spot for me in the Berkshire Veterans' squad. Number three in the eighth team, if I remember correctly.

My reason for boring you out of your skulls with all this personal nostalgia? As I say, I started playing table tennis in 1955 — over sixty years ago. Frightening... And, in all that time, I have only ever once been called for foul-serving. This happened a couple of years ago in an ordinary Reading Division 2 League match and the umpire was — Allan Bruton. To be fair, Allan did not deduct me a point; he merely called a let and gave me a telling-off. Yup, you're right; that's TWO telling-offs (for want of a better word) from Allan in just one newsletter.

Now most foul-servers are either guilty of hiding the ball, letting the ball leave from the fingers rather than the palm of the hand, or not throwing the ball up high enough. I had to do something

different, of course. Ramesh Gehlot had tried to teach me the high toss serve and I thought I'd give it a bash in this particular match. Unfortunately, I threw it upwards far too hard and I had no idea where it was going. At this point I must have taken leave of my senses because I decided to give it a whack before I lost sight of it completely. "Let!" cried the umpire.

And so, just in case you don't know (I DID know, but hoped than Allan didn't – slim chance of that ever happening in the sport of table tennis!!), the ball must be travelling DOWNWARDS at the point of impact. I am not too sure why this is so but, once again, the incomparable Mr Bruton was absolutely correct. Worth bearing in mind. Mind you, since then, whenever Allan has volunteered to umpire one of my personal matches, I have made representations to the opposing team members suggesting that the proposed umpire is totally biased and I should like to have him replaced. It has never worked.
