








Introduction

Kingfisher were well represented in the later rounds of the National 10-to-13 Championships at Preston last weekend. Jamie Liu takes top spot with a Gold medal

in the Under 12 Boys event beating Louis Price from Bristol 3-1 in the final. In the Under 13's, Jamie had a titanic battle with Josh Weatherby from Ormsby in the Semi-Final which Jamie showed his mental toughness to win deuce in the fifth. In the final he met the boy he defeated in last years final, Amirul Hussain from Lancashire, the number one seed. This year, Amirul upped his game to get the better of a tiring Jamie 3-1. For Jamie to return with a gold and a silver medal in his two events was yet another marker as to where he is in English table tennis; comfortably the best for his age in the country.

Kingfisher had more to cheer over the weekend in Preston. Anaya Patel at last showed the level of play that we at the club, know she is capable of. After a nervous start she came up against the top seed in the under 12 girls, Ruby Chan from Yorkshire. Anaya lost the first two ends but then played her explosive best to take the next three to achieve the best win of her short career. In the Semi-Final Anaya went two up against Sophie Chiang from Essex, the number three seed but Sophie was able to edge her way back into the match to take the next three. But this was an encouraging performance from Anaya; to win her first bronze medal in a major and to show that she is in there with the best girls in the country in her age group. Another Bronze for Kingfisher came in the under 11 boys where Felix Thomis battled his way through a tiring day on the Saturday, competing in the singles at under 13 and under 11 as well as the Under 13 doubles. At the end of the day, a Semi -Final of the Under 11 boys singles against Adam Szabo from Yorkshire was a physical step too far for Felix but who (like Jamie and Anaya) one of the best players in England for his age.

Thanks go to the hard working coaches (Dan Basterfield for Jamie, Tom Maynard for Anaya and Alison Broe with Felix) who sat through the whole weekend and suffered the downs with their players but also the joy of the 'ups'.

Week 1 Report 16 May 2016

The first event of the 12 in the Kingfisher 2016 Series got under way with a new sponsor, Blue Jelly Solutions, supporting us. With the extra prize money available, this attracted a quality field of 20 entrants and produced some exciting table tennis.

In last 32 matches Ian Cole scraped home at 7 in the fifth to returning Belgian ace Eric Van Looy whilst newcomer Simon Vine from Richmond showed he was going to be in contention by beating Justin Mead 3-1. Rick Leachman showed his potential when losing three very close games to his opponent from a higher division Trung Tran.

In the last 16, Ian Cole again showed his fighting spirit winning again in five to overcome Steve Miller. Mark Banks fought back well from 2-0 down against Tony Reynolds only to succumb at 4 in the fifth. Andrew Parker looked like he was getting back against Trung Tran but was edged out 3-1. In the quarters Trung Tran met his match in Hari Gehlot, although at one stage looking as though he may take him the distance. Daniel Moses put an end to Ian Cole's run whilst Martin Gunn came back from a game down to beat Tony Reynolds. Simon Vine then completed the semi-final line up in a very tough but brilliant battle with returning Brazilian Elson Costa. The first three games could have gone either way with Elson just losing out.

Two great matches in the semi-finals saw Hari and Daniel go through. Daniel got past Martin comfortably 3-0, a contrast to some of their battles last season where Martin proved a bit of a bogey player. Hari took a couple of close games against Simon to ease through by 3-1.

An all out attacking match in the final with neither player giving any quarter saw Daniel claim the Grand Prix first week's title 3-0 but things could have been so different had Hari managed to pinch one of the two deuce games.

Mark Banks won the consolation event by beating Eric Van Looy 3-1, despite the scare of losing the first game, to boost his points in the table.

Daniel Moses now leads the series with 126 points, 41 ahead of Hari Gehlot and with Simon Vine, Mark Banks and Martin Gunn trailing in his wake.

Week 2 of the Kingfisher Grand Prix brought 18 entrants with a couple of notable exceptions as Martin Gunn and Hari Gehlot were both absent.

In the last 16, Trevor Organ drew series leader, Daniel Moses, who played a pretty much textbook game, using short touch play to bring Trevor in close and then driving him back out long with well placed shots, including a couple of spectacular 'around-the-net' shots. Trevor kept fighting until the end but didn't manage to push Daniel beyond 3 games.

Mark Banks had a clear run through against Steve Miller and Joe Barraclough but couldn't keep his winning streak going when he came up against Martin Adams in the Semi-Final who was still fresh from a 3-game win over Krassi Ivanov.

Daniel didn't give an inch of leeway to Martin Adams in the final, and took the 2nd week top slot in 3 games (11-8, 11-4, 11-6).

In the consolation event Tony Reynolds breezed through Gwynne and Trevor in 3 straight apiece to secure his slot in the final against Simon Vine, who had beaten Ian Cole in 4 and Rick Leachman in 3 to reach the final. The final was well fought, with close games but ultimately Simon didn't quite manage to push it into a 5th set, going out 10-12 in the 4th.

Daniel Moses continues to lead the series with 264 points, 121 ahead of Mark Banks with Simon Vine, Tony Reynolds and Martin Adams completing the top 5.

Week 3 Report 30 May 2016

TABLE TENNIS CLUB

Week 3 of the Kingfisher Grand Prix and things are already hotting up with 18 entrants which included a returning Martin Gunn and first appearance by Robert Gladstone.

In the last 16, Robert Gladstone and Joe Barraclough (who regularly train together) battled it out to a 5-setter of close matches, with Rob clinching victory in the 5th 11-8. This put him into the quarter finals up against Daniel Moses who put an end to his first Grand Prix run in 3 games (11-4, 11-8, 11-5).

After last weeks' defeat in the final, Martin Adams was determined for a better result when he met Daniel Moses in the Semi-Final. Martin took the first end 11-5, Daniel came back to take the next 11-5. Martin replied with another 11-5. Daniel then took the next game 11-8, setting things up for an exciting 5th set, which Martin won 11-9.

Meanwhile, Martin Gunn saw off Sagar Sawant and Mark Banks in 3 straight before meeting Harry Munro in the semi-final, which saw Harry put up a good fight in the third game, (11-9) to push it to 4. This week Martin was equipped with both hard bat and reverse rubber blades, starting the evening knocking up with reverse but switching back to hard bat by the time he met Martin Adams in the final.

Martin Adams, fresh from taking out Daniel Moses was on fighting form and marched on through the final against Martin Gunn, taking the Main Event win in 3 sets, 11-8, 11-7, 11-8.

In the consolation event all of the matches were decided in 3 sets, apart from the semi final between Ian Cole and Trung Tran which went to 5 and brought the watching crowd some great fast counter-topspin exchanges with both players using all of the available court. In the 5th end, after battling hard, Trung's determination paid off and he secured his place in the consolation final with an 11-2 win.

Trung then met Steve Miller in the final and continued to show good form, taking it in 3 straight (11-7, 11-5, 11-6).

Daniel Moses continues to lead the series with 331 points, 96 ahead of Martin Adams who has now overtaken Mark Banks (193). Martin Gunn moves up into 4th position on 164 points and Trung Tran's victory in the consolation brings him into the top 5.

Week 4 Report 6 June 2016

Week 4 – 18 entries. This week saw the return of Hari Gehlot, fresh from the World Vetts Championships in Alicante. We also welcomed Rod Kay, returning to Kingfisher after several years absence.

In the last 16, Richard Fifield scored a 3-0 win over Martin Gunn, who was trying out a new combination of pimpled rubbers with a thin sponge. As the match progressed, Martin realised that adjusting to the new blade would take longer than first anticipated, and Richard took full advantage of the situation, delivering good topspin attacks and dominating the rallies to take the match 11-4, 11-7, 11-4. Last weeks' winner, Martin Adams had an easy first round against Gwynne Penny, coasting through in 3 (11-9, 11-3, 11-3). Meanwhile, Daniel Moses saw off newcomer, Rod Kay 11-4, 11-9. Joe Barraclough put up a good fight against Mark Banks with a close first leg (9-11), but Mark came back strong to take the next 11-3. Joe fought back in the third leg and was rewarded with an 11-7 score but wasn't able to sustain it and lost out 6-11 in the fourth leg. Sagar Sawant had a very close match with Trevor Organ, with the balance of power shifting first one way then the other – 11-8, 9-11, 11-7, 10-12 but managed to win through in the end with 11-9 in the 5th. Tournament host, Rick Leachman had a good battle with Richard Rosinksi – losing the first 2 legs 7-11 and 9-11 but managing to convert the third leg into an 11-9 win. Richard wasn't going to let up easily, and took it in the 4th, 11-9.

In the quarter finals, Martin Adams beat Hari Gehlot in straight sets, although Hari fought back in the second leg and pushed it to 10-12 and 9-11 in the third. Meanwhile, Trung Tran put up a good fight against Daniel Moses, winning the second leg but Daniel finished it in the 4th 11-7.

The final showdown, between Martin Adams and Daniel Moses was a hard fought battle, with some fantastic rallies. In the first two legs there was little between them with Daniel taking the first 11-9 and Martin replying 11-9. Martin then took the advantage in the third leg 13-11. Daniel fought back 11-7 in the 4th but Martin wasn't having any of it and powered through the 5th set 11-4 to win a second consecutive week at the top.

In the Consolation event, Martin Gunn powered through Trevor organ in 3 sets. In the quarter finals he had a very close match with Joe Barraclough (13-15, 11-4, 11-8, 9-11, 12-10). This prompted a decision to then switch back to his trusty hard bat and after a bit of adjustment, he saw off Rod Kay to book his place in the consolation final. Krassi Ivanov powered through David Joyce and Harry Munro in straight sets. Steve Miller put up a good fight in the Semi-Finals, but Krassi managed to close it out in a close 4th set, 12-10, setting himself up for the final showdown with Martin Gunn. Krassi kept his game tight and used well placed attacking topspin shots to dominate the match after a close first leg 12-10 and took the next 2 11-6, 11-8 to win the Consolation event.

Daniel Moses continues to lead the series with 422 points, but Martin Adams has narrowed the gap to 65. Mark Banks is still in 3rd place with 235 but Trung Tran is hot on his heels at 232. Martin Gun slips back to 5th place on 224.

Week 5 Report 12 June 2016

Week 5. This weeks' Grand Prix, hosted by Andrew Parker and Colin Dyke had 20 entrants.

In the last 16, there were some great battles, with two of the 8 matches going to 5 sets and four of the matches going to 4 sets. In his first appearance this season, Joshua Gallen took on Krassi Ivanov. Krassi took the first two sets (11-6, 11-7) and Josh replied with 11-8, 11-6. Krassi took the fifth game 11-2, to secure his quarter final place. Hari Gehlot and Mark Banks had a tense and close 5-set match (with some controversy over nets and edges), with Mark taking the first leg 13-11, Hari replying with 11-7, 13-11 and 12-10 to take the match and secure his place in the quarter final. Yonatan Slobodskoy made some excellent plays during his match with Martin Adams, managing to take the third leg but not quite able to push it to 5 - definitely one to watch though! Rod Kay and Andrew Parker battled it out in 5 close games, with Rod turning the tide in leg 4 (13-11) and then taking the fifth leg 11-5.

In the quarter finals, Martin Adams and Trung Tran had a good match, with Martin taking it in 3 sets, but not without Trung putting up a valiant fight with plenty of exciting fast counter topspin rallies, both players making full use of every inch of the table... and the court.

Daniel Moses and Hari Gehlot both had 4-setters in the semi's – Daniel saw off Martin Adams and Hari proved too strong for Rod Kay.

The final showdown, between Hari Gehlot and Daniel Moses was decided in 3 sets, with Daniel taking the match 11-5, 11-9, 11-5.

In the Consolation event, Richard Rosinski withdrew with an injury which gave Joe Barraclough a pass to the semi finals where he met Steve Miller. Steve started off with 11-1, but Joe fought back in the 2nd and 3rd leg losing both but with a respectable score of 7 in each. Meanwhile, Joshua Gallen took out Jim McAllister in 3 straight 11-2, 11-6, 11-4 and then in the semi finals he and Yonatan had a good battle with the balance of power shifting back and forth until the 4th end which Josh secured with an 11-6 win.

This set up a tough final between Josh Gallen and Steve Miller. Service and third ball attack featured strongly throughout the match. Josh took the first end (11-9), then Steve the second (11-6. Josh replied with 11-8 but Steve came back stronger in the 4th set (11-5). In the final game, Josh managed to secure the win 11-5.

Overall, Daniel Moses continues to lead the series with 549 points and has widened the gap to 128 points between him and Martin Adams (421). Trung Tran on 272 has swapped places with Mark Banks (269) by a narrow margin of just 3 points. Hari Gehlot (234) has returned to the top 5, just ahead of Martin Gunn (224) by 10 points. In the ladies category Gwynne scored her first 5 non-bye points this week, and is still the only lady to play so far in this season's grand prix. Joe Barraclough continues to lead the Juniors on 164 with Yonatan on 84.5 points in 2nd place and Harry Munro on 84 points. Josh Gallen, having only played one event so far, is just a few points behind Harry on 79.

Week 6 Report 20 June 2016

The attraction of England v Slovakia in the football Euros proved too much for some of the Grand Prix contenders on the evening of Grand Prix No 6, resulting in a poor entry of 12. However, it made up in quality for its lack of quantity and there were some cracking matches and performances.

New member Dmitry Khakhamov started proceedings against Trung Tran in an excellent match, but in the end succumbed in three close games. Josh Gallen showed only promise against Martin Adams but will learn from the experience. It was left to Hari Gehlot and Tony Reynolds to close this round with a fine counter hitting match closed out by Hari in the end by 3-1.

Some fairly one sided quarters saw Gehlot, Adams and Moses go through whilst Steve Miller did his best to extend Trung Tran to a fourth but just missing out.

Some great play in the first semi saw Trung Tran push Martin Adams all the way and could have easily gone 2-1 up before having to settle for a 3-1 defeat. In the other semi Hari Gehlot threatened a revival against Daniel Moses but the latter dug deep to clinch the fourth and a 3-1 win.

The final was a classic with neither player giving any quarter with every shot looking a winner but coming back more times than not with even more control. Martin managed to level the scores at both 1-1 then 2-2 but in the end the pressure told and Daniel sneaked home at 8 in the fifth. In the after match interview, they both concurred that it was probably the best final of the series so far and Daniel admitted that it could have gone either way. Both agreed that there had been some fantastic rallies and Martin graciously congratulated Daniel on his win.

The win meant that Daniel surged a further 24 points ahead of Martin to maintain his lead. Current Top 4 standings: Daniel Moses 670, Martin Adams 519, Trung Tran 335, Hari Gehlot 299.

An excellent performance in the consolations saw Josh Gallen beat Dmitry Khakhamov and Tony Reynolds in the quarters and semifinals respectively, both by the tightest of margins 3-2 and 9 in the fifth. He went on to beat Richard Fifield to take all points in the final. Josh now trails Jo Barraclough in the Under 21 category by 70 points.

Table Tennis Legends Visit the Club





Earlier this month at the Table Tennis England AGM, our President, Peter Charters, happened to bump into Mary Shannon Wright and husband Brian, both of whom represented England in the 1960's. They got talking about Kingfisher and it turned out that the Wrights were due to visit relatives in Wargrave the following week, so they popped into Kingfisher to take a look at the club and met with National Under 12's medal winner, Anaya Patel (pictured).

Mary Shannon Wright has an impressive record having won several medals at the world and European championships between 1962 and 1970, including three European Championships gold medals for doubles in 1962 in Berlin, and both the Doubles and Team events in Malmo 1964.

There follows an article from the Table Tennis England Archives, originally published in December 1966 in which Mary and Brian are part of the team that travelled to Novi-Sad to compete in the Yugoslavian Open.

The following article appeared in Table Tennis News (Official Journal of the English Table Tennis Association) in December 1966:

YUGOSLAVIAN & AUSTRIAN OPENS By Ken Mathews

NOSTALGIC ENCOUNTER IN NOVI-SAD

Four exhausting days after competing in the Austrian Open in Vienna on October 29/30, England's representative quartet of Chester Barnes, Brian and Mary Wright, and Karenza Smith were preparing to do battle in the Yugoslavian Open at Novi-Sad and in the team events, which came first, Mary and Karenza fought their way to a magnificent victory.

In the first group, against West Germany, Karenza lost to Di Scholer but Mary leveled by beating Edit Buchholz and following a fine doubles win overcame Di for the match. This last set provided a nostalgic note as it was evident that neither girl was keen on having to play the other.

Karenza started the second Group match, against Yugoslavia, with a good 2-1 win over the home No. 3 Tatjana Jechmenica. Mary followed by dealing severely with Mirjana Resler, the girl who was subsequently to cause such an upheaval in the tournament. A further doubles win took us into the semi-final.

Here we had to play the Hungarian second team of the Misses Por and Papp (Eva Koczian being an absentee—opening a perfumery establishment).

Mary started with a 2-0 win over Por, but Papp beat Karenza to even the score and then, horror of horrors, we lost the doubles. Mary, however, was too experienced for Papp in the fourth set and Karenza beat Por in the decider.

On the Saturday evening before an enthusiastic audience of some 4,000 we took on Russia in the final. Karenza played first and encouraged by cries of "Bravo Shmitd" and "Viva Karenza" repeated her Utrecht success over Zoya Rudnova 2-1.

Mary then had a 2-1 win over a much-improved Golupkova and our girls clinched the match with the doubles.

CREAM CAKES

The Men's team event was a straight knock-out affair, England's first match being against Iran.

On the previous evening Chester had eaten something (probably a cream cake) which had disagreed with him to the extent that he required propping up at the table, where he lost to the Iranian No. 1 Esteshamzadeh. Brian, however, won both his singles and together they struggled through the doubles for a 3-1 win.

Only an hour later, with the dust hardly settled, the English pair had to face up to Kjell Johansson and Hans Alser, and although Brian excelled in taking the European champion to three, it was the Swede who won the decider.

Chester then lost to Alser, but a 2-1 win in the doubles revived sagging spirits only for them to be doused when Brian also succumbed to Alser.

SECOND SUCCESS

England's second success came in the women's doubles when Mary and Karenza resumed their happy partnership wth a final win over Di and Miss Buchholz -20, 10, 10, 19.

In the semis the german representatives had beated Luzova/Karlikova and we had repeated the team event win over Rudnova/Golupkova.

Back to his old self, in the men's singles, Chester had an exceptional win over Kjell Johansson in the third round, in which he revealed the qualities displayed so well at Utrecht. There he had beaten Amelin, but on this occasion the wheel of fortune turned in favour of the impassive Russian.

Bran failed to clear his first hurdle in going down to Anton Stipancic, the young Yugoslav.

The eventual winner was Stepanek of Czechoslovakia, who is a most interesting player to watch, for what he lacks in speed about the court (he rarely moves at all) he makes up for with incredible reflex actions.

PEN-HOLDER

Mary, for the third time this season, reached the semi-final of the women's singles in a a National Tournament, but this time it was Rudnova who prevented her from retaining the Yugoslav title by beating her over five games.

Karenza gave her opponent, Neickova of Bulgaria, a sporting chance in the qualifying round by allowing her a lead of 2 games to 1 and 19-12 in the 4th.

A great fight back for a win at deuce and then another 22-20 win in the 5th just saved Karenza's bacon. She then survived to the second round, where she lost 5 games to the wily Papp of Hungary.

Mirjana Resler is a 14-year-old girl pen-holder, of whom we shall see a lot in the future. With two wins over Di rowe-Scholer, one in the Team Event, the other in the singles, this girl obviously shows great promise. (*Editor's note: Mirjana went on to win the European Youth Championships (Junior) event in Denmark in 1967 and the Mediterranean Championships in 1969 in Athens*).

If this was not enough, she took Marta Luzova to five in the semis, producing a very rapid stream of accurate counter-hits which the Czech No. 1 only

just managed to get the better of.

Ron Crayden, the England Team Captain on this trip, has long advocated the advisability of training some young players as pen-holders in England. The advent of two such players (and remember there are only very few in Europe) reaching the semi-finals of this major tournament would seem to add much weight to the wisdom of his advice.

LUZOVA AGAIN

A very determined Marta Luzova later got the better of Zoya Rudnova in the final and it is difficult ot see how she will be stopped from reaching the No. 1 position in the European rakings as she has so far taken the women's singles title of the first three International Tournaments of the season.

Brian and Karenza lost in the first round of the mixed to Kollarovits/Karlikova -20, -16, -22. Chester and Mary reached the semis where they lost to Stanek/Luzova, the eventual winners over Ebby and Di Scholer.

Coaching at Kingfisher

Kingfisher Table Tennis Club has a long standing ethos of coaching and player development. We are proud of the fact that because we are able to offer excellent practice and training facilities, more of our members have received international recognition than any other UK club of comparable size.

At the highest level table tennis is one of the world's most dynamic and athletic sports. It is a complex sport requiring speed of movement as well as quick mental reactions, fitness, strength and yet a fine touch is also required. This is all needed to reach the highest levels but even to be a good local player requires sporting skills and fitness. Kingfisher aims to create an environment where young and committed players are given the opportunity to reach their full potential in the sport of table tennis. We aim to help our young players develop technical, tactical, physical and mental skills. Also essential is the opportunity to spend the quantity and quality of table time each week, necessary to reach full potential.

Licensed Coaches

At Kingfisher, coaching and training is delivered by the following Table Tennis England Licensed Coaches. Peter Charters, Alison Broe, Graham Outrim, Gwynne Penny and Tom Maynard. To obtain this licence these people have to hold an English Table Tennis Association or UKCC coaching qualification; have a DBS (formerly CRB) certificate, have attended a First Aid and Safeguarding Children course, all in the last three years plus have attended CPD activity each year. The Coach Licence then provides the coach with insurance cover.









As professional coaches, Alison and Graham offer one to one individual coaching to both juniors and seniors. Paid coaches require a Kingfisher Permit from the club to use the facility for profit. This one to one coaching at Kingfisher is by arrangement at a mutually convenient time and will depend on the availability of a table.

Club members who do not hold a valid Coach Licence, but who offer paid sparring/coaching are not covered by insurance. The licensed coach's insurance does cover paid sparrers/coaching assistants working under their direction whilst they are present. The Club's insurance will not provide cover in these situations.

Also, whilst we encourage young players to use Kingfisher to practice with each other, this should be in the presence of a parent or a responsible adult. Parents must accept responsibility that this is adhered to.

Junior British League

In mid-July Kingfisher's second Junior British League team attended the playoffs to attempt to qualify for the Junior British League team next season.

The team consisted of Sam Liu (Captain), Harry Munro, Yonatan Slobodskoy, and Felix Thomis. They did the club proud, just losing the one match winning four against teams from across the country. The one loss may cost them a place in the JBL as Kingfisher 2 but a decision on this will be made soon.

All the boys had significant wins; Felix for example beat the individual National Champion for his age group.


Kingfisher Grouping Tournament 5-6 September, 2016

MINUTES of the 29th ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING held at the Kingfisher Table Tennis Club on Wednesday 18th May 2016.

Presentation of Awards:

Performance of Year: Jamie Liu. In his statement for the reason Peter Charters said this was due, not only to National honours, but to Jamie's International success. He has qualified for the World Hopes final, a rarity for an English player, and this was due to his hard work in training throughout the year. Peter paid tribute to Jamie's parents who sacrificed time and money for Jamie to achieve his ambitions.

Most Improved Junior: Josh Gallen: Peter Charters stated, in awarding Josh the award for the second time, two years after his first win, that he had seriously improved this year. Peter stated that it was difficult to continue improving as each step up the ladder becomes harder to progress. Josh has learnt to control his temper and put in a lot of hard graft to achieve this.

Colin Kemp Award: Allan Bruton. Peter Charters recalled an early morning visit to the club with his grandson and found Allan hard at work ensuring that the club was spotlessly clean. President's Award: Colin Dyke. Peter Charters said, in nominating the Chairman for his award, that Colin was the hardest worker that any club could wish for and clubs needed many more volunteers like him. If any member had a problem this first person they sought was the Chairman.

Minutes of the 28th AGM:

The minutes of the AGM held on 20th May 2015 were agreed to be a true record of the meeting, proposed by Allan Bruton and seconded by Cookie Liu, carried by the meeting and signed by the Chairman.

Matters Arising:

The Secretary reported that unaudited accounts were presented at that meeting and he confirmed that these had been audited and he held this copy in his file.

Chairman's Report:

Colin Dyke added that Allen Pack would not be available as our Facility Officer after the AGM and paid tribute to him. He stated that Allen had been the chief negotiator with Wokingham Borough Council on the building of the venue, was the lead man in obtaining lottery money to complete the build and was the mastermind in the move from the old venue. He was most grateful for all of Allen's assistance throughout. Colin reiterated that he would like to have members shadow the committee to see if they could assist with no binding commitment. With no further questions the report, proposed by Melvin Lovegrove and seconded by Allan Bruton, was accepted by the meeting.

Secretary's Report:

The report was accepted by the meeting proposed by Sandra Shepherd and seconded by Krys Szczygiel.

Membership Secretary's Report:

Cookie Liu asked if the reduction in membership numbers was a cause for concern. Sandra responded that this was more of a normal fluctuation in numbers. Richard Fifield noted that the largest fall was in the under 21 category. Peter charters responded saying that many under 21 players were not members who paid to attend coaching courses on Mondays and Saturdays. The report, proposed by Cookie Liu and seconded by Rick Leachman, was accepted by the meeting.

Treasurer's Report:

Copies of the unaudited accounts were passed to those present. Richard Fifield stated that there was good news with a near £3000 increase making the club financially sound. Income was up slightly but expenditure was down significantly. He added that there were two outstanding matters, a refund of £700 in rates and further contributions to add. All was in line with expectations and, with a healthy coaching fund, all was well. Colin Dyke added that Wokingham Borough Council charged the club 'business rates' which he had challenged and the Council had agreed to waive. He also stated that no lease was yet in place and that no rent had been paid. Colin thanked Richard for completing the report and stated that the new spreadsheet provided by him had made keeping the accounts much easier. Richard Fifield added that Nigel Lynch would complete the auditing of the accounts in the next few weeks.

The accounts, proposed by Allan Bruton and seconded by Peter Charters, were accepted unanimously by the meeting.

The Treasurer stated that the committee had agreed to no change to the membership fees or discounts. This was proposed by Sandra Shepherd and seconded by Roger Woolven-Allen and carried unanimously.

Coaching Officer's Report:

Peter Charter's report covered not only coaching but also the British and National League information. The report was accepted by the meeting after proposal by Derek Crombie and seconded by Allan Bruton.

Proposed Constitution and Rule Change:

The change to the Constitution No. 6 had come from the Chairman who wished to encourage members to wear a club shirt. He added that there should be some discretion if a lapsed member, already having a club shirt, reapplied for membership. Sandra Shepherd added that she had processed three new members who had paid for a shirt with no issues about it. The motion, proposed by Colin Dyke and seconded by Sandra Shepherd, was passed with 2 votes against. Sandra Shepherd stated that membership finished at 30th April and waiting up until July 1st made procedures difficult. The proposed change to Rules I and II would reduce the workload and members would have 21 days from receipt of the renewal notice to obtain a discount. Allan Bruton queried whether those members without email would not get as much time to obtain their discount. Sandra stated this concerned just two members.

Sandra proposed the changes, seconded by Rick Leachman, and these were passed unanimously. As a result of these changes the Chairman put forward the Resolution of Fees that an amount of £20 be added to the membership fee for new members to cover the cost of a club shirt. This was seconded by Sandra Shepherd and passed by the meeting.

Election of Officers and Committee Members:

The Chairman stated that the club needs more volunteers to step forward to help move the club forward. He would like them to shadow existing committee members, without commitment, to see the work involved.

2. Chairman: Colin Dyke (proposed A. Pack, seconded M. Lovegrove) and carried unanimously.

3. Treasurer: Colin Dyke (proposed K. Sczcygiel, seconded A. Bruton) and carried unanimously.

4. General Secretary: Peter Bradley (proposed R. Fifield, seconded A. Pack) and carried unanimously.

5. Coaching Officer: Peter Charters (proposed A. Bruton, seconded S. Shepherd) and carried unanimously.

6. **Membership Secretary:** Sandra Shepherd (proposed P Bradley, seconded P Charters) and carried unanimously.

7. Club Welfare Officer: Mick Mitcham (proposed P. Charters, seconded R. Fifield) and carried unanimously.

8. Committee Members (min 6): Cookie Liu, Andy Yon, Melvyn Lovegrove, Allan Bruton, Gwynne Penny, Rick Leachman, John Liddle and Raj Patel (proposed S. Shepherd, seconded M. Mitcham) and carried unanimously.

9. Trustees: Colin Dyke, Peter Charters, Allan Bruton, Mick Mitcham. (no change)

10. Auditor: Nigel Lynch (proposed C. Dyke, seconded P. Charters) and carried.

The Chairman thanked Allen Pack for his huge influence on the club dealing with raising additional funding during the new build, collaborating with Wokingham Borough Council during this phase and being and outstanding member of the committee as the Facilities Officer. He recommended that Allen should be given Honorary Membership for this (proposed P. Charters, seconded A. Bruton) and passed unanimously.

Any Other Business:

1. Cookie Liu stated that the club needed a Roll of Honour board which needs to be seen. Peter Charters still held a record of these.

2. M. Lovegrove asked when a trophy cabinet was to be installed as it would be nice to display league trophies won by Kingfisher teams. The Chairman stated that this was on the agenda for completion.

3. J. Morris raised the problem of the noise level from the practice tables when league matches were in progress and suggested a curtain to separate the areas. The Chairman said that the matter had been discussed at committee and it was a matter of respect between players that should be addressed.

4. A. Bruton raised concerns about the school usage of the venue stating that they entered the playing area in soiled shoes, failed to turn up when booked in the table diary and generally did not treat the place with respect. He did note that our junior members did exactly the same. He found that kit bags and other items were left in the social area rather than the changing rooms and the whole issue needs further discussion.

5. D. Crombie asked about the lease of the building. The Chairman replied that he had heard nothing from the Council since October 2015 but they had given 100% rate relief.

The date of next committee meeting was set for Thursday 9th June 2016.

Colin Dyke thanked all for their attendance and closed the meeting at 9.45 pm.





40-Minute Session Rule

There are times when practice facilities are at a premium and members are waiting to play. Reminder: Guests

Members may sign in up to 2 guests at a time – **the member must be present** at the club while their guests are at the club.

A guest may visit up to 4 times before they need to decide whether to apply for membership.



A Serving of Sneakles





Did you know....?

....that the coronet that was designed for Prince Charles' investiture as Prince of Wales on July 1st, in 1969 conceals a table tennis ball. Bet you can't spot where!

The coronet was designed by Louis Osman of the Worshipful Company of Goldsmiths. Structurally,

it is an epoxy resin frame coated with two shades of gold. When Osman unveiled the coronet in London, he described it as "something that is modern". It is 24 carat gold, with the 4 Crosses Patées and the 4 fleur-de-Lys made from a nugget of Welsh gold, reinforced with platinum and decorated with diamonds and emeralds. The orb mounted on the top of the arch was engraved by Malcolm Appleby with The Prince of Wales's insignia. This is surrounded by 13 diamonds arranged as the constellation of Scorpio, The Prince of Wales's star sign. The diamonds set horizontally represent the 7 Gifts of God on one side and the 7 deadly sins on the other. The total cost was £3,600.



And Finally....

I've been on lots of table tennis training camps around the country this year and each one has been great, but one thing that really stands out in my mind is in regards to service, but it can be applied during the rally as well.

Often in training sessions we practice set types of service and receive patterns, for example, aggressively pushing the ball long from a short

backspin serve, but at one camp that I went to the task was set for the receiver to try and give the server "the return that they least want". It really made me think about trying to put the ball back in different places to prevent the server from setting up their third ball attack and it made a huge difference once I started to get the hang of it.

Red or Blue?

A recent training camp that I attended included some elements of sports psychology, and specifically on the mindset of the player. Throughout the camp we were given various challenges and encouraged to become aware of our mindset before and during the exercises and matches. After the exercise we reviewed the session and reflected on whether our mindset was in the red or in the blue:

Red (negative) mindset

Results focused Loser Gives in Focuses on others Loses control Leaves to chance

Makes excuses

Blames others

Hot headed



Blue (positive) mindset

In the moment Winner Never gives in Takes ownership Self control Sets goals No Excuses Focused on self Cool headed



For most people the mindset moved between red and blue throughout a match, but recognizing when we are moving into the red can help get us back on track and give us an advantage – I think it's worth a try!
