

I have tried to find someone who knew Geoff well enough **Ceoff Davis** to write a fitting tribute about the ex-Reading Division 1 player but, so far, without success. And so the following is simply made up of my own thoughts about Geoff, with the help of Colin and (believe it or not) of one of my wife's friends.

I still do not know the cause of Geoff's demise. Rumours abound; I have heard that he died of a heart attack and I have also heard a rumour that he injured himself in a bout of karate, resulting in a blood clot that hit somewhere fatal. The most likely story, though, is that he collapsed while acting as ground crew for a balloon flight and that his wife Carol, as far as we know the only female balloon pilot in Ireland, landed and tried to resuscitate him without success.



Which does, of course, mean that the first two possibilities are still possibilities. Whatever the cause, it is all very, very sad.

Having reached the age of 60 in January this year, Geoff was far, far too young to leave us. When someone as young and as fit as Geoff departs, it brings home thoughts of our own mortality. But I am being gloomy. Geoff, so full of life and fun, would not, I am sure, wish us to be morbid. And so I should like to dwell on the fun side of Geoff's life - subject to my limited recollections.

I remember, when I played on the same Reading table tennis team as Geoff, that he had special T-shirts made for us all. On the back of each one, in large letters, was the word "NID" - an acronym, of course. NID stood for "Never In Doubt", a phrase that Geoff often used when one of us had won by the closest of margins in the third end (those were the days of "21-up"). Above the letters "NID" were Geoff's nicknames for us all. I'm afraid that I cannot remember the others', but I do know that my own was "Roger Woolly-Armpit"! I don't know what the weekly opposition made of us!

I remember going, with Cap'n Chris Basden and a whole bunch of idiotic Kingfisher members, to Sweeney Todds's Pie Emporium in Reading's Castle Street, to celebrate my own 50<sup>th</sup> birthday. I really don't know how we

weren't slung out. Geoff had composed a song about Roger Woolly-Armpits, sung to the tune of "Good King Wenceslas" and this motley crew of table tennis players, who would only ever aspire to whispering when singing a hymn, bellowed out the words at the top of its collective voice! I have this sheet somewhere and I shall do my best to lay my hands on it for a future newsletter.

While we were imbibing at Sweeney Todds, someone noticed a beautiful picture of a kingfisher, hanging on the wall. While one of our members was away visiting the loo, the picture was discreetly (but not discreetly enough) removed from the wall and, upon this chap's return, he was presented with the picture along with many congratulatory words for his performance in the previous season.

"I hope he's not running off with that," said the lady waitress, who had observed the whole thing.

Geoff was undoubtedly a "Mr Fix-It". He knew that my father had been killed when his Mosquito fighter-bomber was shot down during World War II – and he also knew that one of my ambitions was to take to the air in a two-seater aeroplane. Now one of Geoff's pals owned a 1929 Pietenpol Air Camper (to give it its full name) and he arranged for me to sit in this as passenger and fly from the airfield to Caversham Park (thereby seeing my own home from not much above roof-height!) and back. The experience was one of the very best of my life! I wore one of my dad's flying jackets – you know, the leather thing with woolly linings and more woolly bits around the collar (Woolly-Armpits,



maybe?) that are often seen in war films - and off we went. The cost? I bought Geoff a beer and a baguette at a pub on the way home.

Quite a few years ago, Geoff moved from Reading to Okehampton in Devon and, I believe, he was instrumental in the setting up of a brand new and now well-known table tennis centre in that town. Later he moved to Ireland where, with his new wife Carol, he set up a bed-and-breakfast business in Crosserlough in Ireland's County Cavan.

Geoff loved sport of all sorts. I remember running in several Reading Half Marathons with him; he loved ballooning (owning two or three of these enormous things) and, of course, he was very partial to a game of table tennis!

I shall end with an extract from a letter written to wifey Lin by one of her old office friends. This friend, Jan Stubbs, moved away to Sheffield three years ago but, by sheer coincidence, when she lived in Reading, she was Geoff's next door neighbour.

"Dear Linda, I was shocked and saddened to hear the news of Geoff's death. Do you know the reason yet? He was such a good neighbour and looked after communal things when he was a member of our residents' committee.

"I recall the time we were having problems with motorists parking their cars in our private parking area and then going off to work in town. Geoff had printed, on VERY sticky paper, a notice informing the offenders that they were on private property and not to park there again. They never did once Geoff had stuck the A4 notices on the each windscreen - on the driver's side! The car owners were obliged to spend about two hours trying to scrape off the offending notices before they could see where they were going! I did say that it was VERY sticky paper!

"Geoff had a daughter who was a talented singer - he once played me a tape of her singing - did she go on to make it a career? Love Jan."

The daughter that Jan refers to is Hannah and, I agree, she was and is very talented. Geoff's elder daughter Laura got married last year in Bristol Cathedral (yup, really!) and she was, and probably still is, a highly skilled tennis player. As most of you will know, Geoff's "ex", Linda, mother of Laura and Hannah, still plays table tennis in the Reading League.

And that, I'm afraid, is about all that I can come up with. I do know that Geoff's brother Bob (whom many of you will also know) is now in Dartmoor Prison at Princetown, Devon. But no, no! Bob is not a felon; I believe that he works there as a fitness instructor.

Goodbye, o fun-loving Geoff; the table tennis world will miss you enormously, but it will also remember you with great affection. (Roger)

I never played with or against Eva Foster, but I do know EVA FOSTER that, despite having such a famous exponent in her husband Bert, she was a highly-skilled and successful table tennis player in her own right. Derek Harrison has kindly supplied me with some

statistics that support this, without a doubt. Eva and Bert have two wonderful daughters and, although I rarely meet Denise nowadays, I sometimes come into contact with Sue. Sue is a nurse at the Royal Berkshire hospital and we bump into each other in the course of her work. Here I have to confess to being the patient that she could probably well do without!

I was honoured to become Bert's last regular doubles partner. Bert won many doubles titles with his previous partners Pete Stafford and Dave Jones, but the Bert/Roger partnership, as far as I can remember, failed to win anything. I can't for the life of me work out where the weakness lay... But, if you will allow me to blow my own trumpet, with just a tiny bit of help from Bert, I did manage to take quite a few unexpected scalps. All right, all right, Bert managed to take quite a few unexpected scalps, despite his partner...

At Eva's funeral, before we entered the service area, Trevor Organ said to me, "I can hear magpies and blackbirds. It sounds as though they're actually inside the building."

Trevor was right - to an extent. There were no actual birds jumping around the pews but, as we made our way to the our seats, background "music" of birdsong was being played. Later on I asked Sue the reason for this and she told me that her Mum just loved her garden and the birds that came with the territory.

Eva's Eulogy 1934 in Eltham, London, one of eleven children.

Eva was born in She was mother to

Denise and Sue, grandmother to Alex and Richard and great-grandmother to Lewis & Marcus.

Eva was a sporty type of girl; she ran for London Borough (White City) and she was an all rounder when it came to sport.

At the age of 17 she was a seamstress down the Old Kent Road, which came in handy when her children arrived as she made many of the clothes for the girls.

Eva's evenings were taken up with teaching gymnastics at night school.

She met Bert, her future husband, at Kings Park School's Evening Institution where Eva was played tennis and Bert played both table tennis and tennis. Eva and Bert also enjoyed ballroom dancing together as Bert was training to be a dance teacher.

Eva and Bert were married in 1954 and moved to Reading, where she joined her husband in playing table tennis and tennis at the Woodlands Club in Tilehurst.

Eva's best season was 1966-67 when she made a clean sweep at the Reading & District Championships winning the Ladies' Singles, the Ladies' Doubles and the Mixed Doubles with Bert.

Eva also had many happy evenings when she indulged in Tenpin Bowling with Bert and Denise playing in the same team.

Eva was a keen angler and with daughter Denise won the first ever Ladies' team competition held by the NFA,. Following in the family tradition Eva's younger daughter Sue took up fishing again after taking a long break and Sue has now replaced Eva in the fishing team. Eva fished for many years, only giving up in 2008 to look after Bert.

Eva was in her element when Alex gave birth to Lewis, her first great-grandson, spending many happy hours watching



his antics as he started to walk and talk. Eva's second great-grandson Marcus, was born to Richard and Ali eight months ago and the process started all over again, making her last few months very happy ones.

#### **FURTHER TABLE TENNIS STATISTICS**

As far as Eva is concerned I gave Sue the information read out at the service. I should, however, like to both confirm and to enlarge on this.

During the 1966/67 season Eva won the ladies' singles and the mixed doubles with Bert She also won the ladies' doubles with Vera Harmsworth. The two girls repeated this the following season.

In 1969/70 Eva finished with an average of 59% in Reading's Division 3 and, in 1977/78 she finished with an average of 73% in Division 4B.

But her best season was in 1978/79 when she finished top of the averages in 4A with a wonderful 85%.

I have to say that both Bert and Eva were great and, back in the 70s, I had the great honour to play in the same team as Bert in the Newbury League's Division 1. In one particular match, with Colin Finden also on the team, I actually managed to win one match and this resulted in our winning 6-4.

# **From Derek Harrison**



administrator for many years now and he is still DFS for Division 4 of the Reading League. Ed.)

On behalf of the Reading Association I would like to pen this tribute to Bert Foster (pictured below). Bert Foster died on the 17<sup>th</sup> April 2011. Besides being a good TT player Bert was the model sportsman who always played the game in a fair and correct manner and he was liked by everyone who crossed his path. Besides playing in the local leagues, Bert played for Reading and also for the County. He won many titles including the Reading



Closed once, the men's doubles five times and the mixed doubles twice, once with Eva in 1966/67. He also won the veterans' singles and the senior veterans' singles twice. He won the men's doubles in the Berkshire closed five times and the veterans' singles once. He served on the Reading committee for seven years, taking on Divisional Fixtures Secretaries' jobs, Intertown Secretary and League Registration Secretary. The information in this part of this tribute was kindly given to me by Colin Dyke. Bert first started playing in the Reading League when he played



for Simmonds Brewery before moving to Woodlands when his team won the Division 1 title eight years in a row. After that he joined the Post Office which, at the time, was a mid-table team but Bert soon altered that by helping his new squad win the Championship in 1969/1970 and 1970/1971 – and again in 1974/1975. I was the Division 1 DFS that season and so I watched some of the matches. Later Bert joined the new Kingfisher Club but only played for one more season before retiring from the sport. However Bert then joined the Kingfisher Committee and was the Club's President for five years – giving much encouragement to the

younger players. What a career! Bert, you will be sadly missed.

After that she worked outside the committee fulfilling many important tasks such as Local League Play Co-ordinator, Contact for Premier Club and Club Mark, Reading League Contact and Volunteer Co-ordinator. And all of this on top of her many tasks for RCBTTA and Bracknell Association.

Following on from this we have been fortunate to have some excellent volunteers to take over those jobs for the Club and I am most grateful to Gwynne and Lisa for volunteering. I'm sure Roger will have mentioned this elsewhere in somewhat more detail.

Now back to our re-location. It is all still going really well at the moment and hopefully there will be a lot more information in the next newsletter. The last bulletin I issued in March still summarises the position except that many of the details have been progressed quite substantially. We anticipate that the transition will be seamless and our expectation should be to move during the first half of the season rather than the second half. # <u>YOUTH TABLE TENNIS</u> HARD WORK IS PAYING OFF..

#### It was the first Regional Squads Championships for the Southern Region Coach, Aled Howell, but he was up for it!

On the 21st April the annual Regional Squad Championships took place in Doncaster at the Dome. The event saw all ten regions of England come together and battle it out for the title. For the very first time the Eastern Region won the event and were crowned regional champions of England for 2013.

The Southern Region Team, playing in a strong group against East Midlands, Eastern, London and North East, was trying to finish in a better position than last year's seventh place. With the help of coaches Charlie Childs, Alison Broe, Rod and Sara McMullan, and Bradley King, the team started well with a draw against East Midlands. Next opponents, and eventual winners of the competition, Eastern region, did not give the Southern team many chances and closed the match with a strong 8-4 win. Despite these two results, both matches could have gone the Southern Region way. It was time for some motivational speech! With a break in our hands, Aled gathered the group and let everybody know that he believed they could do better; it was just a question of the right preparation before the matches! Allegedly, there were tears from some of the other coaches and players after this inspirational talk! And the team did not disappoint: a very good performance against last year's champions, London, and a 7-5 win, which would prove crucial. The last match against North East could see us through in second place in the group. We ended the match with a draw and tied in second place with London. But that good win put us ahead of them. We were going for third place! The match was against North West but despite a brave effort from all Southern players, we could not match their quality and finished overall in an excellent 4th place. In a virtual carbon copy of both the 2011 and 2012 first Kingfisher Grand Prix tournaments, the final match of the inaugural 2013 evening saw Hari Gehlot again defeat the 19-year-old superstar, Daniel Moses.

But, in both previous years, Moses went on to

Gehlot, from Reading's Hamilton Road, came back from two ends down to win the match by three games to two. The fifth and deciding end could not have been any closer, with Gehlot ending up victorious by 12 points to 10.

The 2013 Kingfisher Grand Prix Championships, arguably the greatest and most prestigious out-of-season table tennis event in the South of England, are under way. The series was created by the Kingfisher Chairman, Colin Dyke, some 22 years ago - and is still going from strength to strength.

It is interesting to note that some of the competitors – and some of the very best competitors at that – were not even born when Dyke started the Championships back in 1991. And these youngsters are defeating the older, Countyclass veterans more and more frequently.

Woodley's 14-year-old Daniel McTiernan beat one of Lancashire's very best players, Steve Dobbins, 12-10 11-6 11-7, while 13-year-old Gus Thomis defeated the Tilehurst veteran Trevor Organ in a five-end thriller 6-11 11-7 11-7 9-11 11-5. Organ, renowned for his lob defence played from some thirty feet behind the table, could not completely control the teenager's awesome attacking play.

14-year-old Daniel McTiernan took out the top Belgian player, Eric Van Looy, in three straight games 12-10 11-8 11-9, while Wokingham's Josh Gallen, also aged 14, beat the Polish star Richard Rosinski in four ends 11-6 11-8 9-11 11-9 before going on to despatch Basingstoke's top player Tony Reynolds, again in four ends, at the guarter-final stage.

Another 14-year-old, Leo Long from Newbury, defeated Caversham Park veteran Roger Woolven-Allen 11-8 11-9 11-7 before dishing out similar treatment to the top Tilehurst lady player Wendy Porter. The youngster took out his female opponent by the scoreline of 11-7 11-7 11-7.

But Hari Gehlot is in another league and the youngsters are not yet quite ready to challenge the Indian star. But, as time marches on, so the teenagers' abilities increase - and not even Gehlot is immortal.

The final of the first consolation event was won by Stockport's Steve Dobbins, who defeated Basingstoke's Andy Parker in three straight games 14-12 11-7 11-5.

While I was watching the final of the consolation event between the attacker Andy Parker and the defender Steve Dobbins, it was interesting to see how Andy struggled against Steve's dogged yet brilliant returns. But Andy is a great player, too, and, occasionally, he managed to break through. After one such point, Steve came out

with an interesting expletive. I raised a quizzical eyebrow and Hari, sitting next to me, noticed my reaction.

"That's Manchester-speak for 'good shot'," he explained.



The old order changeth. Well, it certainly does when it comes to the sport of table tennis.

In the second of the Kingfisher Grand Prix tournaments, sponsored by table tennis retailer *Tees* 

*Sport*,14-year-old Daniel McTiernan swept all aside as he romped home to victory. Indeed, throughout the event, the Woodley teenager did not concede a single game – and that included his final match of the evening against chart-topper Hari Gehlot.

To reach this latest final, McTiernan first of all met and defeated Reading veteran Dave Gostelow 11-5 11-6 11-7, before beating the top Tilehurst lady player, Wendy Porter. The youngster won this match 11-7 11-9 11-2 before going on to dish out similar treatment to Charvil and Berkshire veteran Nick Heaps at the quarter-final stage and to Ealing's Bradley King in their semi-final clash.

In the final itself McTiernan, matched against Gehlot, took the first two ends by the closest of margins before running away with the third game and thereby securing overall victory.

Gehlot, however, remains on top of the leaderboard but only by 32 points – a mere bagatelle by Grand Prix standards. The future is uncertain and therefore exciting; anything could happen and it probably will.

Erstwhile second-placed man Daniel Moses fell by the wayside this week. Being obliged to play with a strange racket the teenager was easily beaten, in his quarter-final match, by the Indian star from Reading's Hamilton Road.

The current leader in the ladies' section of the tournament is Caversham's Lisa Williams who, with 68 points, leads her Tilehurst rival Wendy Porter by just six points.

Having won two consolation events in a row, Stockport's Steve Dobbins now finds himself in a potentially prizewinning third position on the leaderboard. In this latest "plate" final, Dobbins beat Wokingham's Richard Fifield in three straight games 11-8 14-12 11-7.




old Dave Gostelow kindly told me all about it afterwards.

Hari Gehlot from Reading's Hamilton Road won the first event; Woodley's 14-year-old boy wonder Daniel McTiernan secured the second and – in the third and latest tournament – Earley's Daniel Moses took the honours. This victory moves Moses (who won both the 2011 and 2012 overall championships) from fourth to second place on the leaderboard, some 69 points behind current chart-topper Gehlot. McTiernan has dropped from second to third place.

In the final of this third tournament, 19-year-old Moses lost the first game to his veteran opponent, Hari Gehlot, but took the second and third ends with comparative ease. Gehlot rallied to take the fourth game but the fifth and deciding end ultimately went the way of the teenager.

To reach this latest final, Moses was first of all drawn against top Frimley table tennis coach Graham Outrim. Outrim knows every aspect of the sport, and put up a spirited fight, but Moses emerged victorious by the close scoreline of 11-9 11-8 14-12. At the quarter-final stage, Moses defeated Woodley's 14-year-old rising star Joshua Gallen in three straight games before dishing out similar treatment to the veteran Polish player Andy Yon. And so to the show-down with Gehlot...



But perhaps the most interesting aspect of this third tournament was the inclusion of two youngsters from Caversham – Sam and Jamie Liu. 13-year-old Sam produced some outstanding table tennis to beat top Basingstoke and Reading Division 1 player Andy Parker. Parker could not contain the speed and agility of his young opponent and, despite a determined fight back, allowed Liu through to the next round in three straight games 12-10 11-2 16-14.

Despite great efforts by some of the other top players, The Kingfisher Grand Prix tournaments always – or at least as far

as recent years are concerned – seem to come down to personal battles between Daniel Moses and Hari Gehlot. Occasionally Gehlot emerges victorious but, more often than not, it is the Earley teenager who ends each competition undefeated. The evening of the fifth Grand Prix was no exception.

In a tournament where there are no seeds and the draw is random, Moses and Gehlot could meet each other at any stage. However, in the latest event, these two top players did not meet until the actual final. Moses won this last match in three straight games and, as a consequence, finds himself not only at the top of the leaderboard, but some 89 ahead of his Indian rival.

14-year-old Daniel McTiernan, who is capable of beating either of the two stars, did not play in the fifth event. The effect of this is that top Basingstoke player Andy Parker has leap-frogged the Woodley youngster. Parker now sits in the potential prize-winning third place, just 17 points ahead of McTiernan.

Caversham's Lisa Williams, situated in 14<sup>th</sup> place, is the current leader of the ladies' section, some 43 points ahead of Tilehurst's Wendy Porter, her nearest rival.

To reach this latest final, Moses first of all met and defeated Berkshire County player Nick Heaps. Moses won the first two ends easily, beating the Charvil veteran 11-5 11-4 but, in the third game, Heaps played like a man possessed and, to tumultuous applause, staved off defeat until eventually having to concede by 11 points to 13.

At the quarter-final stage, Moses had little problem against Ealing's Bradley King and the Londoner fell in three straight games.



In their semi-final, Basingstoke's Tony Reynolds took a game from the Earley teenager and only lost the fourth end by the closest of margins.

Interest along the way saw an amazing battle between two Caversham players. Top lady player Lisa Williams – still very much a youngster herself – was drawn against the octogenarian Mike Dorrington (pictured) and everyone expected to witness a comfortable victory for Williams. But the senior veteran fought every inch of the way and only succumbed in the fifth and deciding game. Williams managed to sneak victory by the scoreline of  $6-11 \, 11-6 \, 11-2 \, 10-12 \, 11-7$ . An exhausted Dorrington left the court – and the competition – highly satisfied with his personal performance.

The final of the fifth consolation event was won by Tilehurst's Trevor Organ who defeated Polish player Andy Yon in four games 11-8 12-14 12-10 11-3.

Despite a determined effort by Hamilton Road's Hari Gehlot to stop him, Daniel Moses has now won four Kingfisher Grands Prix in a row. The Earley teenager's latest victory has pushed his points tally to 642, some 123 ahead of his Indian rival. After this

sixth TeesSport-sponsored event, Gehlot remains in second place.

Gehlot was unlucky to lose the final match of the evening, falling by the closest of margins in the first game and then taking the second with ease. But Moses hit back, taking the third end 11-8 and then the fourth by those two crucial points. This close result earned Gehlot a share of the spoils, but Moses was undoubtedly, and deservedly, the champion.

To be fair, Gehlot had the hardest draw. At the semi-final stage, he met the only player - Woodley's

Daniel McTiernan – who could realistically be expected to beat either of the top two. This particular match went the distance, with Gehlot just pipping his 14-year-old opponent at the final post.

Moses had a relatively easy run to the final showdown, with perhaps his hardest match being that against Basingstoke's top player, Tony Reynolds, in one of the early rounds of the competition. Moses struggled in the first game, but ultimately went through by the scoreline of 9-11 11-6 11-7 11-8.

McTiernan has now retaken third place on the leaderboard, leap-frogging another talented Basingstoke player, Andy Parker, in the process. Because of work commitments, Parker did not attend this latest event and, as a consequence, has dropped from third to fifth place, just below another rising star - Josh Gallen. Woodley's 14-



year-old Gallen reached the semi-finals before bowing out to Moses. The youngster, though, had previously taken out the top veteran Berkshire County player, Nick Heaps, in five exciting ends.

Interest along the way saw 81-year-old Mike Dorrington defeat the top Tilehurst lady player, Wendy Porter, 11-6 11-7 11-2. This was a great result for the senior veteran from Caversham.

Another particularly exciting match saw the up-and-coming Newbury youngster, Leo Long, defeat the Caversham Park veteran Roger Woolven-Allen in a tussle that went to the wire. 14-year-old Long emerged victorious by the scoreline of 11-2 9-11 11-8 8-11 11-9.

The final of the latest consolation event saw Tony Reynolds defeat Leo Long in four ends 11-5 9-11 11-8 11-7.

England's Number 6 Junior table tennis star Liam McTiernan made his personal debut entrance into the Kingfisher Grand Prix Championships – and immediately took the seventh title.

But the 17-year-old Junior international did not have things all his own way. While he defeated chart-topper Daniel Moses in the latest final with apparent ease, he struggled against the veteran Hari Gehlot at the quarter-final stage. Gehlot no longer has the teenager's speed and agility, but the Indian player still possesses amazing skill. McTiernan triumphed as expected, but it took him four incredibly close games to succeed in his mission.

In his semi-final, McTiernan had to face Basingstoke's top player, Tony Reynolds, but the Hampshire star had no answer to the youngster's ferocious play and fell in three straight games.

In the final itself, where McTiernan was matched against chart-topper Daniel Moses, the spectators were hopeful for an exciting and close contest. They were disappointed; once again the Woodley youngster brushed his slightly older opponent aside.

With just one solitary tournament under his belt, McTiernan finds himself almost halfway up the leaderboard; just another couple of appearances could well change the entire table!

Earley's Daniel Moses retains his top place in the charts, some 166 Grand Prix points ahead of Hari Gehlot.

Caversham's Lisa Williams has dropped from 10<sup>th</sup> to 13<sup>th</sup> place on the leaderboard, but still remains at the top of the ladies' section and in line for the "Best Lady" award. However, Tilehurst's Wendy Porter, currently in 17<sup>th</sup> position, is only 26 points behind her rival and these two top lady players could swap positions at any time. Exciting times ahead!

Interest along the way saw the 14-



year-old Woodley player, Josh Gallen, push chart-topper Moses all the way, before allowing his rival to win their personal battle 9-11 9-11 11-3 11-6 11-8. Gallen, however, remains in fourth position and, without doubt, poses a major threat to the three stars above him.

Young Gus Thomis who, at 13, is the youngest player in the championships, pushed the top Belgian player Eric Van Looy all the way before letting his opponent through by the scoreline of 11-9 12-10 9-11 11-13 11-7. How the old order changeth!

The final of the seventh consolation event was won by Liam McTiernan's younger brother Daniel, who defeated Van Looy in four ends 11-4 11-6 8-11 11-4.

The third-place play-off match saw Liu beat Thomis 3-1 (11-7 11-3 8-11 11-8).

I haven't seen too much of Paul Beck lately (I guess our paths



simply haven't crossed) but he has certainly been up to a thing or two!

Paul took part in the VETTS Southern Masters Championships held recently in Crawley

and our man certainly excelled himself! And not for the first time either... In the first round Paul beat George Evans, the ex-Welsh Number 1 and the VETTS ex-

World Singles Champion by the scoreline of 11-2 11-8 9-11 11-9.

In Round 2, Paul was drawn against Maurice Newman, the England Number 1 and the top seed. Paul won this encounter 6-11 9-11 12-10 11-9 12-10. To put into context how good a win this was for Paul, some years ago the Octopus had beaten the England Number 1 John Hilton in two straight games (these were the days of 21-up) and then went on to defeat Brian Burn, ex-England Number 4, for the first time ever. In the next round of the same competition, Clayton inflicted the biggest



thrashing Paul had ever received, taking out the Octopus 21-6 21-2. But how the tables have been turned now!

However, let's go back to Crawley! Paul nearly ran a lap of honour when he took the first game against Clayton, while nevertheless thinking that he was still going to lose the match in four ends. At the time, Paul tells me, it was unthinkable that he should win a single end, let alone the match! He kept thinking that he was shortly going to wake up to find that it had all been a dream!

Paul was now through to the semi-finals and found himself drawn against Terry Parkins, a player who had beaten him in their one and only previous encounter. But Paul won through, again in five, by the scoreline of 9-11 13-11 7-11 11-9 11-6.

The Kingfisher's Junior Championships were again a success with four events and 108 matches scheduled over six and a half hours of the late morning and afternoon of April 27th. For many of the entrants this was their first



tournament and, in some cases, the first time they had ever played a 'proper' match with an official umpire. Our thanks go to volunteer umpires Aled Howell, Lisa Williams, Peter Bradley, Darren Thomas, Tim Coombes, Sandra Shepherd, Chris Squire and Eric Van Looy without whom the tournament could not have taken place.

With only two contestants, Beechwood Primary School pupil Zak Squire won the Under-11 competition with a win over 8-year-old Johnny Coombes from Robert Piggott Primary in Wargrave.

One of the most closely contested events was the Under-13 singles where, on paper, the event could have been won by any one of four players. As it turned out, unseeded Ben Thomas, having beaten Katie Shepherd in the semis, took the title with a five-game win over Number 1 seed Alex Squire.

The Cadet Singles (Under-15) competition finished very much as predicted with the top two seeds meeting in the final, and what a final it was! Having beaten Joseph Cornmell and Isaac Farnworth in the semis, last year's winner Leo Long and Sam Liu battled it out. Sam took the first game easily and Leo levelled only for Sam to take a 2-1 games lead before Leo won the fourth to take the match into a decider and then took the fifth game by the narrowest of margins 12-10.

The final event, Kingfisher's blue riband competition, the Junior Singles, was organised in groups of five players with four seeds (Leo Long, Sam Liu, James Ellicott and Isaac Farnworth) exempt until the last 16. Group winners Joseph Cornmell, Kieran Warre, Adam Gozzard and Alex Squire were joined in the main draw by the seeds and those players who had finished second and third in each group: Scarlett Jones, Jamie Lomax, Katie Shepherd, Bertie Coombes, Ben Thomas, Abdel Mukhtar, Kevin Gurung and Kian Kasler.

Of all the contestants, probably the most unfortunate was 13-year-old Bertie Coombes who, having lost 10-12 in the deciding game against Kieran Warre in the groups, then lost by exactly the same score against the Number 4 seed Isaac Farnworth in the last 16.

As it turned out, all four seeds reached their allotted positions in the semi-finals with last year's runner-up, Sam Liu, easily despatching Joseph Cornmell in the quarters and James Ellicott in the semis to book his place against Number 1 seed Leo Long in the final, Leo having won 3-0 against Adam Gozzard and Isaac Farnworth in the quarters and semi respectively.

The first game of the final was really tight with both players having game points before Leo finally clinched it with a nail-biting 16-14. When Sam won the second game it looked as if the contest could be as close as the Cadet Singles final between the same two players, finishing at deuce in the deciding game. However it wasn't to be. Leo's consistent counter-hitting allowed him to take the third and fourth games to win the title.

All three took part in the recent ESTTA English Schools tournament in Doncaster and each walked away with a medal: Liam with gold in the Under-19s, Maria with silver in the Under-16s and Amy with silver in Under-13s.

Parts of The Bulmershe School in Woodley are decades beyond their life expectancy and will be

replaced when work starts in the autumn.

The major scheme, approved by Wokingham Borough Council's planning committee on Tuesday, will include a post-16 learning centre, a remodelled library and information centre, an improved dining hall and an on-site student inclusion centre.

The new facilities will also be available for community use.

Cllr Simon Weeks, chairman of the planning committee, spoke about the "poor state of a number of buildings" he saw on a site visit.

Headteacher Emma Reynolds said; "School environments send powerful messages about the value of education and the sense of pride students and wider communities should have in their schools."

She continued: "Our building stock is half a century old and is less than efficient and effective. New classrooms will replace life expired rooms which are not fit for purpose in the 21<sup>st</sup> Century.

"By life expired I refer to classrooms that regularly leak, where heating breaks down, where windows fall out - buildings designed to last 25 years that are now 50 years old."

A tendering process will now start to choose a contractor to carry out the works, which are being funded and managed by the borough council. Some of the refurbishment and priority work - such as new classroom doors - has already started because it did not need planning permission.

# Kingfisher Coaching Report – 2012/13

The main thrust of our coaching activity as been with juniors. 89 youngsters have attended organised coaching classes during the year where Peter Charters, Eduard Caliman, Peter Bradley, Steve Dobbins and Nick Heaps have either led or assisted on a voluntary basis.

A further 40 pupils from Bulmershe and Addington Schools have received coaching from the club and approximately 150 Bulmershe pupils regularly use our facilities to play table tennis as a curriculum sport activity.

In many respects the club's unofficial junior section could be said to be thriving: junior membership is at an all-time high; our beginners and intermediate classes (Monday and Tuesday) are now at capacity; we have three girls (Maria Tsaptsinos, Megan Knowles and Amy Blagbrough) and one boy (Liam McTiernan) ranked among the country's top ten juniors; and we have ten members selected for ETTA Regional Development and Performance squads (Amy Blagbrough, Sam Wilson, Sam Liu, Jamie Liu, Leo Long, Josh Gallen, Daniel McTiernan, Liam McTiernan, Megan Knowles and Maria Tsaptsinos).

Taking all the above into account we appear well positioned for the next step in the development of a junior section, however:

- Most of the above 'elite' juniors are also members of other clubs, (though they still see Kingfisher as their primary practice venue).
- The club's junior section doesn't have an identity it is both unofficial and informal. Junior members, whether beginner, intermediate or elite players, do not share a common identity or feel part of the same community. The only factors that



link members together are attendance at Kingfisher or ETTA coaching groups and participation in JBL/NJL/NCL team events. There is no press coverage of successes, no playing kit, no newsletter, no social media community

- To deliver on a promise that *every member will be given the opportunity to achieve his or her potential in the sport*, we need more coaching resource. As a minimum, we need a young professional coach working within the club for at least 15 hours a week.
- To support the development of our 'intermediate' players, we need to provide them with tournament experience advice on events, assistance with transport or accommodation, support and mentoring at the event.
- To grow the club's influence in the local community (KSDP), we need to assist with the purchase of equipment and to provide high quality coaching in a few schools within our immediate catchment area (8 to 10 hours a week).

In order to grow, as we would wish, we need more resources – specifically people and money. If we could create both an active volunteer committee and suitable financing, Kingfisher has every opportunity to become one of only two or three hot spots for junior table tennis in this country.

We desperately need more coaches and coaching volunteers

We will provide support and mentoring to any member wishing to qualify as a coach and become active in our coaching programme. We will pay for DBS (formally CRB) checks, we will assist in obtaining bursaries and (subject to remaining involved in Kingfisher's coaching) the club will credit any new UKCC coach with £100 against their next annual membership.

Whether an experienced player, a parent or family member with no previous playing experience, you could become a coaching volunteer and assist with our coaching sessions. Coaching is remarkably satisfying and neither youth nor high playing standard is a requirement for success, please contact the Coaching Officer to discuss helping to develop tomorrow's players.

#### **COACHING FINANCES AND DEVELOPMENT**

Kingfisher's 2012/13 income from coaching activities (Coaching Permits, Coaching Guest Fees, Kingfisher Schools Development Programme) was £1,781.50. This figure has been ring-fenced for future investment in junior development activities to be authorised by the committee.

Kingfisher's facilities, vibrant junior membership, schools community programme, elite junior players and reputation for player development are all attributes that could make the club an attractive partner for commercial sponsors at a time that table tennis is growing in popularity.

By harnessing the business skills of our members, if we could attract annual sponsorship in excess of £20k, we could formally create a junior section that:

- Employs a professional coach, working part-time for 15 hours per week
- Provides competition support (entries, transport and accommodation expenses)
- Enters 30 players in national competitions (JBL, NJL, and NCL)
- Provides sponsor-branded clothing for upwards of 100 pupils attending Kingfisher community coaching, 40 junior members in training and 30 players (+ coaches) representing Kingfisher in national competitions and tournaments
- Funds an Outreach programme where, by providing equipment and coaching in schools, 200 primary and secondary school children in Woodley, Earley, Twyford and Wargrave would be introduced to table tennis.

To achieve this goal we wish to recruit a small and energetic sub-committee that would work to attract and manage commercial sponsors and fund the development of Kingfisher's junior section. This will be an exciting phase in the club's development. If you feel you can contribute - whether a player, a parent or 'friend of the club' - please contact the Coaching Officer.


