## KINGISHA IV HIGH

The Kingfisher Club will be performing in the top flight of British table tennis next season. After battling their way to first place in the six-team playoff for one of two places in the Premier Division of the British League where

they will face the strongest club teams from the British Isles – including Scotland. On this occasion, the Woodley-based club had the shortest journey of all the teams taking part last weekend in Slough.

Kingfisher, winners of the Southern Division had to come through against the top two teams from the North and Midlands divisions as well as repeat their victories over the Southern division's second team Bournemouth.

On Saturday Kingfisher's first opponents were Woodfield from Birmingham and Marcus Giles (pictured) got Kingfisher off to the best possible start with an 11-4 in-the-fifth victory over Adam Nutland – the highest England ranked player taking part over the weekend.



The next three results all went Kingfisher's way, each close in the final game. Dave Barr beat Amann Ubhi; Daniel Kolesnik beat Jimmy Walsh, and Berkshire Champion Federico Viterbo got the better of Anthony Barella. Nutland was just too strong for Barr's defensive style to get one back for Woodfield. Ubhi beat Viterbo in five before Giles steadied the ship with a three-straight win over Walsh. Kolesnik finished the job with victory over Barella.

It was Bournemouth next up for Kingfisher. The 7-1 final scoreline belies the tenseness of the first hour as each of the first four matches were won by Kingfisher very closely in the fifth and final game. Daniel Moses came in to the team for Viterbo and his two wins over the Swede Niklas Meijer Garmstad and Stephen Foster were crucial to the team's result.

Captain Barr is an inspiration to the team with his battling, physical performances and, in the match against Bournemouth, his determination to overcome two players who had good results over him this season kept his team in the match and set the tone for a hard-fought victory.

The pre-play-off favourites were Kingfisher's next opponents. London Academy boasted two more top Swedish players leading the team at one and two positions. Sebastian Loso and Jesper Berglund put the Londoners two up with wins over Giles and Barr but it was Moses and Kolesnik who levelled it for Kingfisher with results against Ryan Maynard and Gabriel Achampong respectively. The two Swedes put the Academy side two in front again with victories over Barr and Moses but a Giles win over Achempong and a Kolesnik triumph over Maynard sealed the draw and a point for Kingfisher.

This draw was to prove decisive towards the final table. Both teams would be promoted but, with Kingfisher having the superior games difference and the London Academy losing their final match to Bournemouth after fielding two younger players, Kingfisher finished two points clear at the top.

Hari Gehlot came into the Kingfisher team on Sunday morning against Derwent with Barr rested after his extreme exertions during the three matches on the previous day. The 6-2 victory over Derwent guaranteed Kingfisher promotion and a final match win against Burton, also by six games to two, pushed Kingfisher into the winner's spot.

Only six players have represented Kingfisher throughout this season including during this Premier Playoff weekend. The outstanding fighting spirit and togetherness of the squad made the difference to this success.

### AND THE SAME STORY FROM THE ETTA'S PERSPECTIVE:







Kingfisher and London Academy have been promoted to the British League, Premier Division via the play-offs. Kingfisher topped the group of six clubs in the series, played at Cippenham TTC, having won four matches and drawn 4-4 against their nearest rivals to finish with nine points.

Both sides started with back-to-back victories, Kingfisher beating Woodfield 6-2 and Bournemouth Sports 7-1, while London Academy saw off Derwent 7-1 and Woodfield 5-3.

The key meeting between the two top sides in Match 3 saw Kingfisher twice come from two down to claim a 4-4 draw.

Jesper Berglund beat David Barr (pictured above, centre) in five and Sebastian Loso made it 2-0 by beating Marcus Giles in straight games, only for Daniel Moses (pictured above, left) and Daniel Kolesnik (pictured above, right) to emerge victorious against Ryan Maynard and Gabriel Achampong respectively.

Barr then lost in five again, this time to Loso, who went on to finish with a 100% record from his 10 matches. And when player-of-the-match Berglund beat Moses 3-0, it looked as if London were on course.

But Kingfisher came back again, Giles beating Gabriel Achampong 3-1 (11-8, 12-14, 11-9, 11-9) and Daniel Kolesnik then leveling matters with a 3-1 defeat of Ryan Maynard (12-10, 6-11, 11-5, 11-9).





Both teams won their fourth encounter – London triumphing 7-1 over Burton Uxbridge and Kingfisher 6-2 over Derwent.

But it was Kingfisher who took top spot as they beat Burton Uxbridge 6-2 in their final match, as the Academy were beaten 5-3 by Bournemouth Sports.





It was 3-3 going into the final pairings. Stephen Foster's 3-1 win over Hiba Feredj (11-5, 11-3, 9-11, 11-6) put the south coast side in front, and player-of-the-match Niklas Meijer Garmstad then completed victory by beating Eren Gozcu 3-2 (11-6, 9-11, 11-6, 7-11, 11-8).

It meant London had to settle for second spot in the final standings with seven points.

Bournemouth finished third on five, with Woodfield, Burton Uxbridge and Derwent each picking up three points.



### Maria earns bronze medal with England

(The following was submitted to the Reading Post, issue dated 23 April 2014, by Peter Charters)



The ISF World Schools Championships were held in Clermont-Ferrant in France last week.

The England girls' team included Abbey School girl Maria Tsaptsinos who helped her team win the Bronze medal in the Team Event behind China and Chinese Taipei, by far the strongest two teams involved. The England squad, which include Maria's Kingfisher club mate Tin Tin Ho, had beaten France (4-3), Turkey ((6-1), Bulgaria (5-2) and Greece (5-2) to win Bronze but lost to both of the top two sides 1-6 and 0-7.

In the Individual Girls' Singles event, Maria beat Maria Yovkova of Russia 3-2 in the group stage but missed out 3-0 to China's Shiting Chen in the first round.

This event provided Maria with more valuable experience of international table tennis heading towards the major junior event of the season the European Youth Championships in Italy during July.

Another Kingfisher player selected by the English Schools' Association for the World Schools' event was Marcus Giles.

Playing in the team event, the England boys' team also found the presence of the Chinese and Chinese Taipei teams intimidating. The England team beat Turkey with Marcus winning one but losing in five to Sahin Zihni.

England then lost to Chinese Taipei but again Marcus took one of his visits to the table with victory over Huang Yang in five.

In the individual event, Marcus came runner-up in his group, losing to a Chinese team player but beating players from Chinese Taipei and Greece. He beat Omar Khassal from England in the first knock-out round but then faced the European number one, David Reitspies from the Czech Republic and went out three straight.

Federico Viterbo (pictured) clinched his first Reading Masters title by beating Hari Gehlot in the final.

He won 11-4 14-12 11-9 in the decider played at the Kingfisher Club.

The tournament was split into two groups of five and produced some tremendous table tennis, with close contests full of amazing counter-hitting and stunning shots.



In Group 1, Gehlot, Daniel Moses and Steve

Murgatroyd all finished with three wins apiece, so the placings were decided on a games countback involving the three. Gehlot took top spot with a 5-3 average, followed by Moses on 4-2 and Murgatroyd 3-5.

In Group 2, Viterbo won all his matches with Trung Tran runner-up.

The Viterbo versus Moses semi-final went one way then the other with some incredible counter hitting.

Viterbo won 11-9 8-11 11-0 9-11 11-8.

The other semi-final also went to a fifth game decider, with Gehlot edging out Trun 11-8 9-11 10-12 11-6 1103.

Trung beat Moses in the third/fourth place decider 10-12 23-21 (yikes! Ed.) 13-11 7-11 11-2.

The Reading Junior Masters was also played on Sunday with nine players being invited to compete.

Pre-tournament favourites Josh Gallen (also pictured) and Siad Cole both qualified from Group 1 with Michael McAllister and James Ellicott also going through to the semi-finals.

Gallen edged out Ellicott 11-9 11-6 11-7, while Cole defeated McAllister 15-13 13-11 16-14. Ellicot won a marathon match to decide third place, beating Michael 11-9 3-11 7-11 11-8 12-10.

In the final, Gallen clinched his first Junior Masters title by winning 11-9 11-6 11-6 with some stylish play against a battling opponent.

All the Juniors received medals, provided by Andy Yon.

## Defibrillators

I think that just about everyone has heard of a defibrillator and how this device can save lives. But what exactly is it and how does it work? Well, I had a squint on the old 'net and discovered the following:

A defibrillator is an electrical device that provides a shock to the heart when there is a life-threatening arrhythmia present. The arrhythmia that we worry about is called ventricular fibrillation. This is a very rapid erratic beating of the heart. Multiple parts of pacemakers in the heart start sort of beating erratically and the heart can't rhythmically contract. And what the defibrillator does, it provides a shock that basically shocks the heart to stop so that it can start rhythmically contracting again. So now you know! Hello all






























With just a few days to go until the Big Move time is short but, hopefully, we will get enough done to enable us to move and start enjoying our new home.




## The Kingfisher Summer Grand Prix

top level British League commitments, the first tournament produced some interesting results.


Kingfisher TTC has nearly 200 members – quite something for a single club anywhere in the world, let alone in Reading – and quite a few of these players turned up for the inaugural event. Many more are bound to follow as the series progresses...

The first final was contested between the up-and-coming teenage star Joshua Gallen and the experienced Chinese

player Yeqin Zeng (pictured). This match was nail-biting to say the least. Zeng (known as Philip on the table tennis circuit) took the first two ends from the 15-yearold Wokingham player, before Gallen bounced back to level the match at two games all. Play on every other court was voluntarily suspended as the fifth game swung to and fro. Finally, experience showed and, to great applause, Philip took the deciding end 11-8.

Zeng, of course, now heads the Grand Prix table but there are many players who will wish to topple him. Stars such as Hari Gehlot, Daniel Moses and Daniel McTiernan will almost certainly make an appearance before long. The second tournament may therefore well produce a few changes!

Following a first round bye, Zeng was drawn against Lower Earley's 15-





In his quarter-final match, Zeng defeated Jim McAllister's elder brother, Michael, 11-5 11-2 11-9 before going on to play one of Basingstoke's top players, Andy Parker, at the semi-final stage. Somewhat unexpectedly Parker struggled and he, too, failed to win a game, losing out 9-11 6-11 6-11. And so to the exciting final itself...

Before the final showdown, Gallen (pictured) was again involved in a tense and extremely close match, this time against another top Basingstoke player, Tony Reynolds. This semi-final match was another see-saw affair, with both players taking two games apiece. But the Wokingham youngster moved up a gear to take the final game 11-5, thereby earning himself a meeting with Zeng in the first final.

Because of the complete restructuring of the Bulmershe School buildings, Kingfisher is shortly to move into brand new premises adjacent to Woodley's "Goals" clubhouse, but the table tennis club will remain part of the School campus. The new premises are nearing completion and the Grand Prix tournaments will shortly take place at a new and exciting venue. Nearly 200 members can hardly bear to wait!

The final of the first consolation event - in which all first-round losers have a second bite of the cherry - was contested between Caversham Park's Roger Woolven-Allen and the Italian player Luca Bianchi. Woolven-Allen managed to take the match 11-1 11-9 11-8, thereby earning himself lots of points (much to the chagrin of Colin Dyke, who foolishly won a couple of matches in the main event) and placing himself in fourth place on the table and some three satisfying points above Andy Parker – a position that it is almost guaranteed he will be unable to retain.

The following pieces have been taken from *Kingfisher News*, Issue 3, dated Spring 1991. The first, written by one Brian Halliday, is all about two of Kingfisher's most famous players – Matthew Syed and Alison Broe (née Gordon).

Towards the end of this issue, there is a snippet concerning Yours Truly when he was a reasonable player, and also a lovely story about Ian Schwartz. Finally, there is a superb home-made cartoon but, I regret to say, I have no idea who the artist was. But please read on...

# Matt and Alison An Appreciation

I first heard about the Syed brothers from Peter Charters (pictured, below, with author Brian). Both Andy and Matt were pupils in his class at

school and Peter explained that he introduced them to table tennis as both lads seemed to him to have a desire to succeed in anything they did. All this before they had lifted a bat!

Of course, there is more to any major success story than just a Godgiven talent, but it was Peter who recognised, nurtured and developed the two players. Not an easy route — much hard work, long hours of practice and training night after night with the stars of the Omega Club. At that dilapidated hut in Green Road a host of top line players (some of them pictured below!) had been produced by a man for whom coming second meant failure. The environment that the Syed brothers found themselves in bred success and it was not long before Andy was developing an attacking



game to trouble the best in England. Matt at this time pottered along in the shadow of his brother's achievements but in his dedicated way he was himself carving out a special niche in the English game.

The loss to our sport of Andy's fine all-round game has been compensated by Matt who had developed into one of the most exciting players in England. He is, apart from his mentor Chen Xin Hua, the supreme exponent of the defensive arts, although his game has progressed to include lightning attacks when the opportunity arises.



I make no secret of the fact that the type of Game Matt plays is more akin to Sonning Common than Kingfisher and a special rapport has grown from kindred spirits more attuned to the third-ball push than the second-ball attack.

As I write these notes, Matt is playing for England in the World Championships in Japan. This is his second "Worlds" and is the climax to an unforgettable season for our Club's Number 1 player. It is an extremely rare event for an English player to win a foreign Open but Matt did just this in Czechoslovakia recently — an achievement which has culminated in his being awarded the Viktor Barna award for the outstanding performance by an Englishman this season.

Successes - and there have been so very many -

have not turned his head. He was particularly helpful to the Berkshire veterans last year before their visit to Baltimore, with practice and training that helped us to compete with some of the world's best and ensured that we played at the peak

of our own performance. Matt himself (pictured recently, right) played devastatingly well in the States, so much so that he was offered, and accepted, a contract to play in Sweden.

His record of unbroken success is unbelievable and very soon he will have to make the difficult decision as to his future within the game. It came as no surprise that he has been accepted for a place at Oxford University and the inevitable study must impose a restriction on top-class sporting activity.

Still there is one record yet to crack. When he was very young, Matt took some real beatings from the Sonning Common trio. As he got older the standards got closer. Several times he managed to win two — usually losing out to Wally Allanson — and then came the great day. He beat Wally and then, believe it or not, lost to your scribe. A couple of years ago we were involved in a play-off with Kingfisher. Here, surely, was his chance to win three. But, no! We craftily ensured that we lost 6-0 (playing to a result only) to make sure that rather special record



was maintained and that Matt has yet to achieve his entire life's ambition and get a coveted maximum against the three players who appreciate his special talents to the full.



In more years than I care to remember, I have known all of England's top star players, certainly since the early 1950s. Names like Di and Ros Rowe (pictured), Mary Shannon, Jill Hammersley and Karenza Matthews. Alison Gordon deserves to be in this bracket of star names. Her long list of supreme achievements deserve comparison with those of the aforementioned. The game has developed enormously since D Rowe was at her peak. Di and the others were very great players in their time but Alison has had to cope with major technological breakthroughs by way of super rubbers — and super glue. It is amazing how she has managed to keep her place at the pinnacle of the game in this country. Certainly the men's game is more attack-focussed and it is easier to get results quickly if you are an attacker. The converse is true with the women's game where it is easier to achieve honours by combination-bat expertise.

Like Matt, Alison has had to demonstrate a dedication second to none. She has developed into the complete professional table tennis player with a will to win that is always evident wherever she plays throughout the world.

I had not been in Reading very long when, one night, I went over to the Bulmershe Sports Centre hoping to find someone to practise with. The main hall was deserted but I managed to track down the distant sounds of a table tennis ball. In the back room, on the far table, in semi-darkness, Alison was playing against Reg Hart, her coach at that time. She was playing with an intensity that had to be seen to be believed. With the sort of motivation so well demonstrated on that night so many years ago, she could not help but become a top star.

I hope these few notes can bring it home to those that aspire to stardom (Make a note, Josh! Ed.) that the road is long and it is hard. The rewards for the superstars of our sport are reasonable but not great in monetary terms. The rewards that the game offers in the development of human beings are beyond price.

I, for one, am proud that both Matt and Alison are members of our Club.


### THE CLUBHOUSE - NEW EVERYTHING (well almost)

### **NEW 'PHONE NUMBER:**

The new clubhouse will have a mobile phone in place of the current landline. The new number is **0743 4586 247** and is operational now.

### **NEW ACCESS ARRANGEMENT:**

All members will be issued with an access fob which will be needed to enter the new club house. This fob replaces your current small Yale key, which should be exchanged/returned to Sandra Shepherd the membership manager who, subject to AGM approval, is expected to take over from Eric. Sandra will advise members direct on date/time for exchange of key/fob.


The existing large mortise key will still be valid for the new club house with its use exactly the same as the old building (last person leaving building locking up and first person in morning opening up). Subject to AGM approval it will be a requirement for all members to now have a key and fob and any member who does not currently subscribe for a key set will need to apply for one for the 2014-2015 season, paying the appropriate deposit.

The new fob has been introduced for a number of reasons;

- To increase security
- To avoid our current annual key change
- To manage temporary membership
- To help optimise the use of the club

• To help reduce the administrative work load of adding/ removing members

Each fob has a unique number which will be registered to a member. Family members can request additional key sets and then paying the appropriate deposit.



### MEMBERS' ACCESS TO THE CLUB HOUSE:

The new club house, being situated next to the *Goals* football centre and on the direct pathway to the school will mean that a lot more people will be in the vicinity. If the current open door policy was to remain in operation this could pose a security concern. For this reason the door should not be fixed open.

The first person entering the club will need to unlock the door using the mortise key and then present their fob against the access reader with the next person only needing to present their fob to the access reader. Please register your attendance at the club using the reader as this helps to understand utilisation of the club, *ie* don't tail gate!

### **NON-MEMBERS' ACCESS TO THE CLUB HOUSE:**

For visitors an intercom system has been installed to enable guests to identify themselves. Members just need to press the exit button to allow guests to enter. A door "spyhole" has also been requested to allow visual verification if required.

#### **EXITING THE BUILDING:**

Just press the exit button. The last person leaving the building will need to lock the door using the mortise key.

### **PARKING ARRANGEMENTS:**

Car parking arrangements are being clarified but, in the meantime, we suggest you should park in the Goals/Bulmershe School car park on the right, follow sign shown below, or if this is full, one of the nearby spaces.

### **NEW FLOOR:**

The main playing area has a sprung floor with a top cover which is designed specifically for table tennis use. This high-standard flooring provides excellent playing conditions but it does require careful attention when tables,

exertent playing conditions

chairs or score tables are moved. Only sports shoes are allowed in the playing area — strictly NO stiletto heels. A daily sweep of floor will be required to keep the surface in top condition and avoid grit causing permanent scratching to the surface. Further information on the use and care/maintenance of the playing surface will be provided at the club.



#### **NEW LIGHTS:**

New lights have been installed to provide consistent lighting levels for a four-table layout to competition standard. A fifth row of lights has been provided to cater for additional table(s) in practice layout.. The switching control system for the lighting is very similar to that of the old clubhouse. The last member leaving the club will need to ensure that the lights are switched off in the main playing area and that the master switch next to the exit door in the social area is switched off.

Lighting in the new stores room and ladies/accessible facility is automatic.



### KINGFISHER TABLE TENNIS CLUB 20 May 2014

(Please note that the following proposal was written BEFORE the AGM and

is, therefore, very much subject to ratification. Please also see the general note in the Epilogue. Ed.)

The following, proposed by Allen Pack/Colin Dyke, refers to the issuing of key fobs and deadlock keys:

### **CURRENT SITUATION:**

Existing members fall into two categories regarding the holding of keys to access the old club building. The first category have paid £9 and have a Yale key and a deadlock key. The second category chose not to pay the £9 and have no keys.

#### **NEW SITUATION:**

For our new Club, if we are going to have the fullest security possible, it is essential that <u>all</u> members have an access fob so that we can track who has come through the door, etc. They will also need a deadlock key which is the same one that we have always issued (the lock mechanism was transferred). This is for "first in and last out" as was previously the case.

We are able not only to identify who has entered but will be able to block entry for any member who has defaulted in payment

etc. The door will be magnetically locked at all times and not wedged open as happened at the old clubhouse.





For any member, guest or visitor turning up without a fob there is an audio entry system where they buzz and a door release button operated from the inside will let them in. We shall need to agree upon a way of recording their entry. Perhaps a visitors' book. Members already registered in will have to be educated that anyone let in on the audio system will need to sign the book even if they have just forgotten their fob.

We propose therefore as follows:

For existing members who have paid £9 for a set of keys, we shall exchange the Yale key for a fob.

For existing members who do not have keys, we shall issue a fob and a deadlock key for a £9 deposit. This will be mandatory and will apply to all grades of members. This will be requested when they renew their membership. The exception will be where one family has more than one member and requires only one set. At least we know that one of the family members has accessed the Club and the family will be jointly responsible.

For new members we should make a £9 deposit mandatory as part of their joining procedure for a fob and deadlock key.

All deposits will be refundable when the member returns the fob and deadlock key. Lost fobs and keys will cost £9 to be replaced.

The School normally has two sets of keys. We should issue two fobs plus deadlock keys but explain that the party will have to arrive as a group as the door will close behind anyone arriving singly. This, in any case, will be a good discipline.

Until we get into an annual routine, Allen and the new Membership Secretary from the AGM will work out a system to ensure as many members have fobs and keys as quickly as possible collecting £9 from anyone not previously having held keys. We will have to offer the exchange of the Yale key for a fob by post for those members who can't fit in with these arrangements. Also to request non keyholders to pay a deposit quickly for a set. There will be a requirement to purchase a number of extra deadlock keys as soon as possible and Colin will source those.

# Paul Drinkhall

An incredible display from four-time English Champion Paul Drinkhall saw the 24-year-old become the first Englishman to win an ITTF World Tour Open since Carl Prean in 1996.

The man from Loftus, Cleveland was in sublime form throughout the GAC Group 2014 ITTF World Tour

Spanish Open in Almeria as he beat Dimitrij Prokopcov (Czech Republic, World Ranking 82), Yuto Muramatsu (Japan, 88) and Matasaka Morizono (JPN, 80) to claim a historic achievement for an English player.

Despite being only the 23rd seed for the tournament, the English No 2 stormed through the field to give English table tennis a major boost just months before the Commonwealth Games arrive in Glasgow later this year.

The new champion said: "I'm feeling tired but feeling amazing; it's a great achievement especially after the first match being a bit shaky. I could have gone out, but fought through it and got stronger as the tournament went on.

"It's definitely up there with anything I've achieved in my career – my first senior title. Hopefully there will be more to come. It's a big year, with going for promotion to the top level in the World Team Championships and then the Commonwealth Games."

Despite it being his first experience of a major final, Paul says he was able to keep his emotions under control so the situation was not too nerve-wracking.

"It was and it wasn't," he said. "I started to focus on each point and just to win that and I didn't really think too much about what was happening or what the score was.

"Obviously it does come in to your head when you get to 10, but I tried to get it out of my head straight away and focus on the next point.


"This can give me a confidence boost towards the other tournaments and hopefully if we're in the medal matches or promotion matches I can use this experience to help."

Coach Nicky Jarvis said the achievement was made even greater by Paul having come back from an operation on his hip last summer.

He added: "He came back from the operation with a very strong mind. His preparation before every match was what it should be for a champion. He said when he beat the Czech player in the quarter-final it was the best table tennis he'd played in his life.

"He was focused and very professional, the epitome of a top sportsman."

And that even extended to Paul's post-tournament celebrations as he avoided alcohol in favour of water – although he did allow himself some ice cream!



Championships, Club the summer Grand Prix evenings, pre-season Grouping Tournament and the very popular out-of-season Thursday evening Club nights.


members For enough (or lucky enough!) to have some free time on
